Second Teller—Not exactly. You know, she runs the S to Z book. Well, after she sorted her checks, I slipped a proposal on the back of a blank check into the stack.

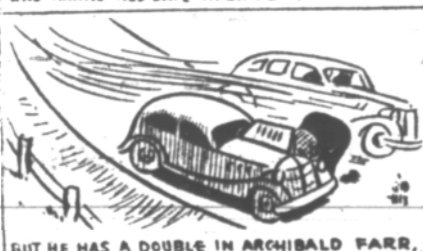
