Mrs. Roosevelt, on these occasions, merely appears for a few minutes, smiles, bows, says a few remarks and leaves. A peculiar gift of the president is that he can discuss local affairs (particularly political) of any part of the country with all the authority of a native. In public the secret service men guarding the president never look at him—they watch the crowds, which is a different system from that in vogue in other countries. 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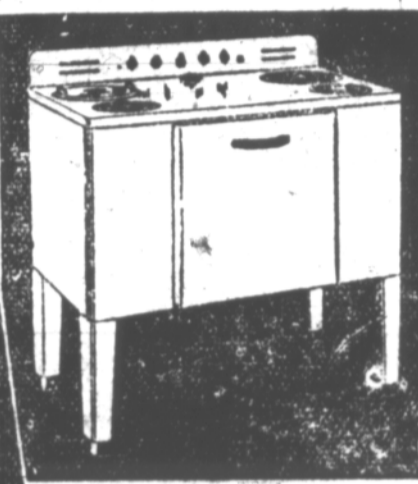
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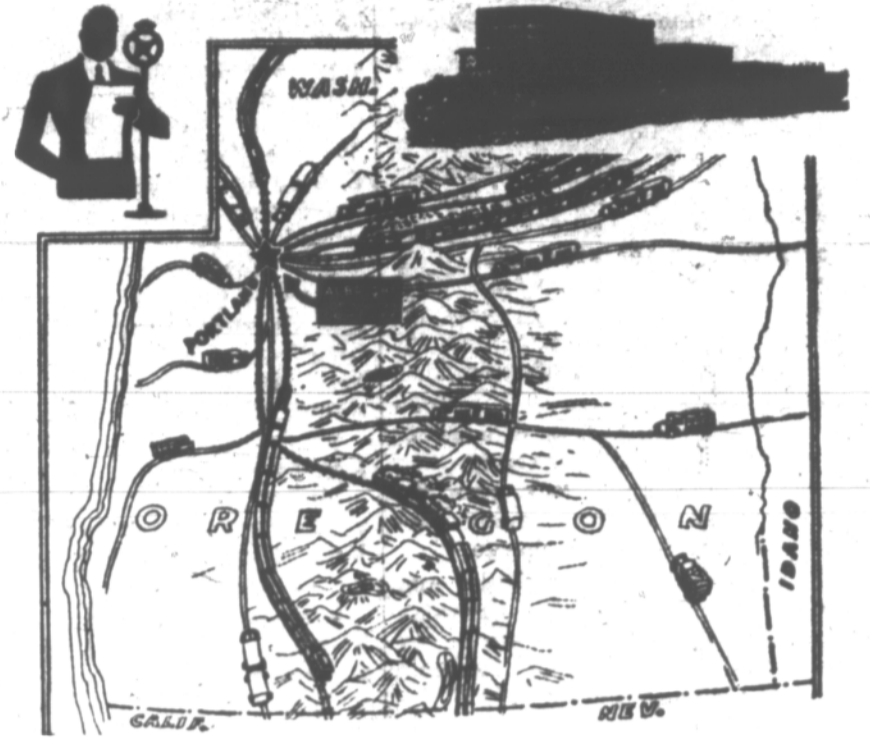
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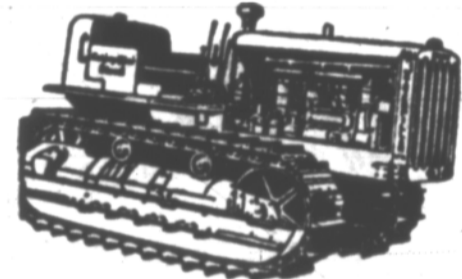
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
