BONNEVILLE BOSS TO ADVISE PUDs

Frank A. Banks, Acting Administrator of the Bonneville Project, took up his duties at Portland Thursday with the assurance that he would study carefully electrical problems of the area and speed the sale of Columbia River power to communities along the transmission network now under construction.

The new Bonneville chief indicated he would confer with public utility districts and power companies and find out the facts so that proper policies may be formulated. "I want to get my feet on the ground, find out just what the situation is, and do the best I can to carry on where Mr. Ross left off," Banks added he expected to report his findings to the Secretary of the Interior and to the national power policy committee.

In regard to the activities of public utility districts, Banks offered to assist in every way in the sale of Bonneville power to them. "If they come to us for advice, we shall give them the best advice we can. However, I don't think we should dictate policies. They are prospective customers of ours, and should be regarded as such."

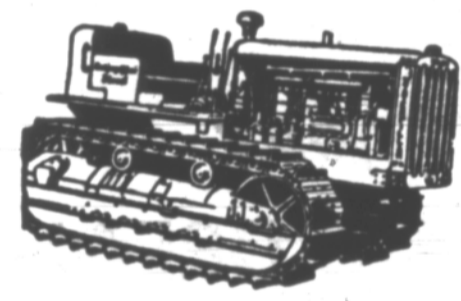

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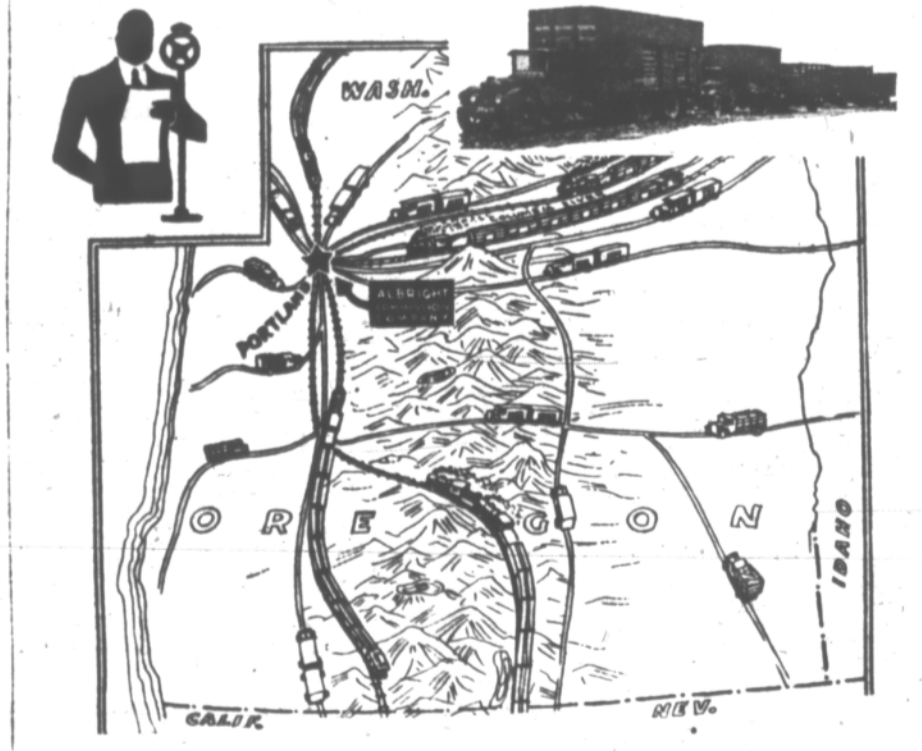
