Mr. and Mrs. Ira Fridley and daughter Joan, shopped in The Dalles Monday.

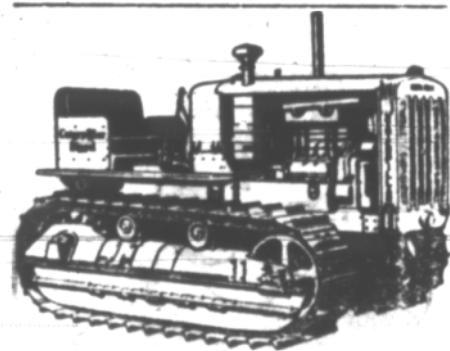
Miss Effie Andrews of Athens spent several days here with friends.

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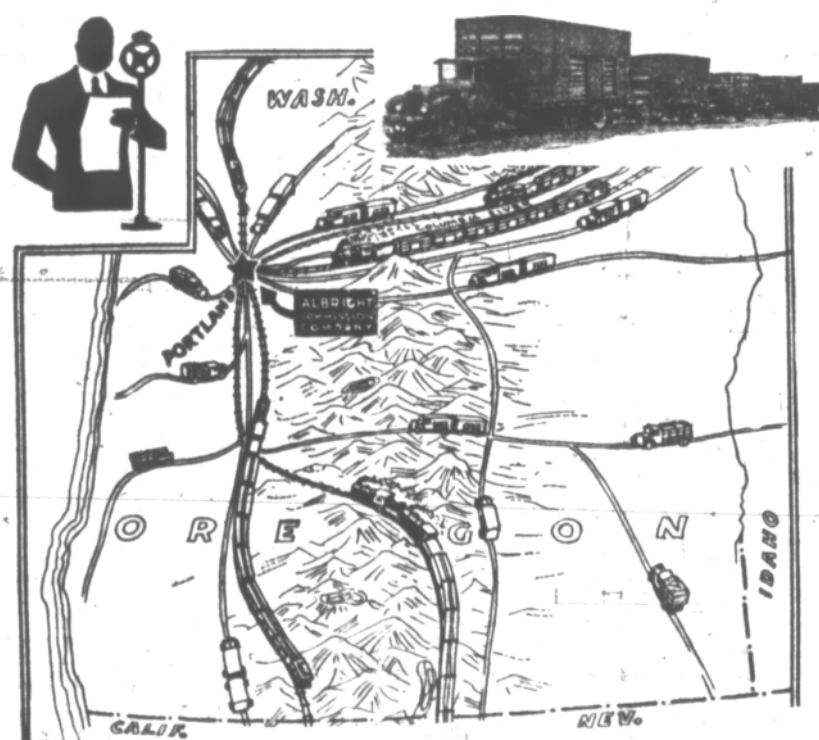
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Students May Earn Way For \$350 a Year

How university students may go to school on a budget of less than \$350 a year is described in a new bulletin entitled "Co-operating for an Education," just issued by the University of Oregon student cooperatives at Eugene. It tells the history, purposes, achievements, and membership requirements of the organization which is completing its fourth year this spring.

The cooperatives, now with nearly 200 members, strive for less than living costs without sacrificing any of the advantages of group living. The average cooperative student budget for a year is less than \$350, according to the bulletin. Board and room costs are approximately \$19 a month for girls and \$20 for boys.

Most of the cooperative students both boys and girls, earn from one-half to two-thirds of their college expenses while in school. A few are putting themselves thru without any outside help. In spite of this the groups have stood at the head of campus scholarship averages consistently the last 3 years.

Started as a mid-depression experiment with a single men's house and only a handful of members in 1935, the organization has grown to six houses with nearly 200 members.

The cooperative houses have a complete social and athletic program. Additional activity is provided through participation in varsity debate, publications, drama, music, art, campus honoraries, and office holding in numerous campus organizations.

pend, the Bonneville engineer said, on local and national realization of the inherent natural advantages of the Columbia basin. "It is primarily the job of the people of the region to find out what the facts are: what raw materials they have, existing and potential markets, and their relation to power and transportation."

Block assured members of The Dalles Public Power and Industrial Association that Acting Administrator Frank A. Banks was eager to assist every community in stimulating industrial development, and that the Bonneville Project would

make studies so that specific industries could determine where it is feasible to establish factories.

CREAMERIES PROTEST
