

Sheriff's Office Turns Over More Taxes

The county sheriff's office reports that in June 15 turnover amounted to a total of \$15,609.12 of which \$8,230.14 was from current taxes and \$7,378.98 from delinquent taxes. This is being divided among the taxing units that share in the payments.

A community picnic in the Grass Valley park will be sponsored July 4th by the Kent Legion post for the purpose of giving everyone a place to meet their friends and neighbors on the nation's holiday. For entertainment there will be a softball game between the Grass Valley team and Moro team in the morning and the Wasco team will play the winner in the afternoon. The park will be open to everyone to come and bring their picnic lunches. A dance will be given the night of the third and another the night of the fourth. All entertainment, except the dances, will be free to everyone.

Light Dimming Now Mandatory

Highways and streets of Oregon will be made safer by new regulations pertaining to operation of motor vehicles in the state which became effective Wednesday, June 14, it was announced today by Earl Snell, secretary of state. The new regulations are incorporated in new laws and amended laws enacted by the 1939 session of the state legislature and which became effective 90 days after adjournment of the session.

In the future motorists will be required to dim their lights whenever they meet an oncoming car at night, Snell said. In the past, dimming was required only when meeting a car while traveling on a wet, hard surfaced road.

Glaring headlights are frequent causes of accidents and the law requiring dimming may be expected to reduce this hazard, he declared.

Under the amended law regulating licensing of drivers, the secretary of state is required to refuse an operator's permit to any person "afflicted with or subject to recurrent attacks of unconsciousness." This change was believed advisable in view of the danger inherent in persons suffering physical or mental disabilities leading to fainting spells while driving cars in modern traffic, Snell said.

Installation and operation of special traffic signals pertaining to pedestrians only is authorized by a new law. These signals will instruct pedestrians to "WALK" or "WAIT" and will not affect vehicular traffic. Such signals are now being installed in Portland and may be installed in other cities under provisions of this law. They are designed to protect pedestrians and are said to have reduced pedestrian accidents in other cities where they have been placed in use.

Thirty-seven pedestrians walked abruptly into trouble during the first quarter of 1939 when that number walked into the sides of automobiles, Earl Snell, secretary of state, revealed today. One was killed and the rest injured.
