BOYNEVILLE LINE

TO GO TO HOOD RIVER

Acting Administrator F. A. Banks today assured officials of the newly organized Hood River People's Utility District that Bonneville power will be available to them within a year. The Hydroelectric Commission of Oregon yesterday approved formation of the district, which was voted by a majority of the residents of the county on June 19th.

110,000 volt transmission line

"Delivery of power to Hood River People's Utility District" Banks said, "of course is dependent upon acquisition of a distribution system by the district. We shall be glad to assist the district in every way in the solution of its engineering and accounting problems, so that Bonneville power can reach Hood River consumers at the earliest possible date."

The Bonneville Administrator pointed out that the proposed monthly rates for wholesale energy, if approved by the Federal Power Commission, will be especially helpful to the Hood River People's Utility District. Under the suggested schedule the district need take only the amount of power required for its month-to-month needs. The proposed rate is 10c per kilowatt-hour, plus a monthly charge of 75c per kilowatt of contract demand.
