Even in the "good ole summertime" we Americans demand an occasional pie - it must be part of our ancestral inheritance.

Because pies invariably contain much fat and sugar they are in the class of energy foods. Their contribution in the diet is fuel for the muscles and the inevitable production of heat and energy. For the necessary minerals and vitamins we must see that we get sufficient fruit and vegetables, particularly green and yellow, milk - one quart a day for children and a pint daily for adults; and an egg at least five times weekly. If your diet includes these essentials you can then expand your meals with the more typically energy producing foods - and here is where pies will come in - that is, unless you are having to watch the waistline.

This time of year berry pies are our special weakness but berry pies were never intended to sit like prim models for hours without drooping. They are supposed to be juicy, so go easy on the flour. The less time that elapses after they are out of the oven the more compliments you will get. This holds true, of course, with any fruit pie, and if you have tried fresh berry pie with cream, heavy or whipped, you know why it can become an almost incurable habit.

Even if you are peering daily at the scales don't rob yourself of the pleasure of an occasional berry or fresh fruit pie. Here are two pie recipes that have won favor in many a household.

Berry Pie
Three cups fresh berries
One cup sugar
3 - 4 tbsp flour
One eighth tsp salt
One tbsp butter
One tablespoon lemon juice

Mix fruit with combined sugar, flour and salt. Fill pastry lined pie pan, dot with butter, cover with pastry strips and bake in hot oven (450 deg.) about ten minutes; reduce heat to moderate (350 deg.) about 30 minutes to finish baking. Makes one 9-inch pie.)

Peach Cream Pie
Two and a half tablespoons flour
Fresh peaches
Few grains salt
One egg

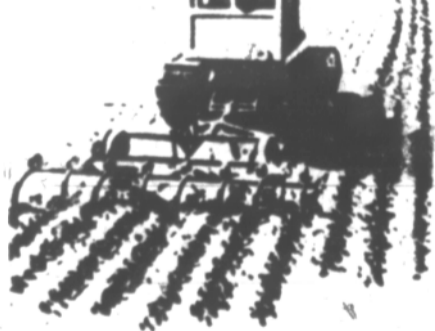
