1939 Wheat Production Up

Wheat prospects improved in July so that production is expected to be 731.4 million bushels, 15 million bushels above the July estimate, according to the government estimates of August 1. Corn prospects declined to 2,460 million bushels, but improvement in oats,

barley, and grain sorghums nearly offset the reduction in corn crop prospects. Hay production prospects improved slightly. The potato estimate was cut nine million to 356.8 million bushels.

General crop prospects in the county as a whole remain much the same as a month ago despite local changes and in respect to certain items, according to a recent digest of the situation by the O.S.C. extension service. Conditions are somewhat less favorable than a year ago, and considerably below 1937.

Among the changes noted in the situation since the first of July was damage to pastures and range, corn, and other late crops in extensive northeastern and western areas. On the other hand, conditions improved in much of the central and southern corn and cotton areas.
