Farmers May Join AAA Without Pay

The 1940 agricultural conservation program will permit any farm with a wheat acreage allotment to be designated as a "non allotment" farm if operators wish, said announcement this week by Will Steen of Milton, chairman of the state AAA committee.

Such farms will not be eligible for 1940 price adjustment payments, conservation wheat payments, or wheat loans but may grow the usual acreage of wheat for grain, or 10 acres, which ever is larger, and still participate in other AAA benefits. This provision is intended to simplify the operation of the program and make it more flexible, particularly with respect to those farms on which wheat is used for hay or cover crops.

Steen announced that farmers would be requested to choose their own classification by signing a wheat plan participation form before October 30. He emphasized that farmers who failed to sign this form before October 30 would not be eligible for the 1940 price adjustment payment.
