Law Abiding Bird Hunters In Quandry

Speculation as to what game regulations to follow is rife in this county since District Attorney Brown of Wasco county gave his opinion that the game commission exceeded its authority when it declared the bird season open October first.

A law passed at the last session specifically states that the open season for birds in Wasco and Sherman counties, among others, should be October 15 to 31. The last section of the law provides that the game commission could close the season for the purpose of protecting birds but further provided that "nothing herein contained shall be construed so as to authorize the game commission to provide an open season inconsistent with this section."

Many hunters have shot birds since the first of the month and if the section of law dealing with open season for such birds is held consistent with general authority given the commission they are clearly against the law despite the ruling of the commission declaring the season open.

The attorney general will rule on the matter soon but it may not be entirely cleared up until the courts have taken some action.

New Headlamps Conform With Law

Oregon laws regulating automotive lighting equipment are in conformity with specifications adopted by the automobile industry in its development of the new "Scaled Beam" headlamp system, it was announced today by Earl Snell, secretary of state, who played a part in the nation-wide study which led to the development of the new lamps.

The new headlamps are designed to give increased visibility for night driving, longer and more efficient service at no increased mileage cost, and virtual elimination of glare. They were developed as a result of a three-year study instituted by the automobile industry, the Automotive Safety Foundation and the American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators.

The design of the new lamp differs from the present standard lamp in that the reflector, lens and light source are in one compact unit, permanently sealed to prevent dust or moisture from entering the unit. They are said to give a wider and longer range of light while the upper or "Country Beam" is employed and a longer range along the right shoulder of the highway and reduced glare to the eyes of approaching drivers while the lower or "Traffic Beam" is employed.
