Motorist Pays \$50 A Year In Taxes

The average Oregon motorist pays \$50.84 each year for the privilege of owning and operating his automobile.

The figure, according to the Oregon State Motor association, represents the amount of local, state and federal taxes paid by the average car owner in Oregon in 1938.

A national survey made by the American Automobile Association shows that the average U. S. motorist paid \$51.87 in 1938, or approximately one dollar more than the Oregon motorist, it was pointed out.
