Telephone Co. Buildings Going Up Soon

Construction of building for the new dial telephone exchanges for Moro, Wasco and Grass Valley was started this week.

With the building program under way all other steps necessary for the new dial telephone systems will be coordinated and completed within the next few weeks, according to J. R. Farrington, manager for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Date of the actual change-over from the present types of service to the dial service tentatively has been set for the latter part of January. Within the next two weeks, a crew of men will begin installing new dial telephone instruments on customers' premises. Telephone customers will continue to use their old instruments until the actual cut-over is made. At the time the new dial telephones are being installed, the installation men will give full instructions on how to use the new dial instruments.

Actual installation of the new dial central office equipment in the three buildings will be started about December 1, with the completion scheduled well ahead of the cut-over date to allow ample time for testing the equipment.

Included in the change over to dial operation will be the 260 or more former line customers now being served by the three exchanges. All of these customers also will have dial telephones installed on their premises.

Emergency Shelf Needed In Kitchen

The beginner in home economics responded to the review question, "What is an emergency shelf?" with, "It's a shelf in the kitchen where you lie down when you get tired."

This coed's idea of an emergency shelf may not be such a bad one, but fortunately this business of feeding a hungry family three square meals a day is not as time consuming and energy wasting as formerly. What with all the emphasis on properly balanced meals and the inclusion of the protective foods... milk, fruits, vegetables and eggs... in adequate amounts, we find that these are often the very foods which require the least amount of preliminary work before set on the table.

Even in rural homes few of us have any longer to make endless trips to the cellar, the milkhouse, and the smokehouse in preparing a dinner. Our kitchens are planned to save steps, we own many labor saving devices, and with our modern refrigeration we can keep innumerable fresh foods in supply and know they are safe. Homemakers today have little excuse for appearing at the dinner table as if they had been "through the mill." So, while an emergency shelf is not to rest on, it has a purpose.

Guests do drop in occasionally at meal time (even our Aunt Sue by marriage has been known to arrive just at noon with every evidence of not having eaten lunch) and then we can thank our lucky stars if we have foods stored on an emergency shelf.

If you have on your shelf canned

asparagus or crab meat, as examples, either one can be creamed in a few moments and served on toast and would make the center of a grand luncheon. And while we are agreed that homemade soups are the best, it pays to keep a few canned varieties on hand - just in case. Canned purees combined with milk and seasoned with butter make quick delicious soups.

Have on your emergency shelf a tasty and well seasoned salad dressing. Then vary your salads by adding to this basic dressing a generous amount of crumbled Roquefort cheese or a combination of Roquefort and horseradish, or chili sauce. Any number of ideas could be suggested.

Here is a lunch on menu for a person who has no supplies on your emergency shelf (that is, if you have the shelf stocked). It requires but a few minutes to prepare.
