### Mrs. Inez Nash Dies Suddenly

Mrs. Inez Nash was born at Nunda, N. Y., on February 16, 1868 and passed away November 10, 1939, at her home, 914 South Pacific Avenue, Kelo, Washington, after an illness of a few hours. She was a Gold Star mother of the World War and a member of the Legion Auxiliary; also a member of the Royal Neighbors and the Methodist church.

She was the widow of the late Judge M. J. Nash who was Justice of the peace and Police Judge for many years. She was preceded in death by a son Porter Nash who died at Camp Lewis in 1918, and her husband, M. J. Nash, who passed away in 1929. Mrs. Nash had resided in Kelo 21 years, and was widely known throughout the community.

Besides the daughter, Mrs. Florence Olson, she is survived by several nieces as follows: Mrs. Inez Sargent of Wasco; Mrs. Long, of Silver Springs, N. Y.; Mrs. Grace Lawry of Rickreall; Elberta Mills, Wasco; and Mrs. Newcome of Los Angeles, California. Nephews—Harry, Vernon, and Bryan Van Gilder of Wasco and Darwin Van Gilder of Moro; Lavern Porter of Salem; George Porter of Dayton; and Bert Porter of Lakeview.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist church Sunday afternoon, November 12, at 2 o'clock. Rev. Harold Bashor officiated. The pallbearers were members of the Gay Rathbun post of the American Legion. Interment in the Odd-fellows Cemetery.
