Bonneville Lines Being Built

Erection of transmission lines for marketing Bonneville power will proceed with minimum inconvenience to property owners and tenants along the right-of-way. Administrator Paul J. Raver today laid down policies to be followed by the project land division which will speed up payments of money to property owners and minimize future litigation.

Instead of buying property outright, Dr. Raver has directed his staff to purchase easements, which give the government the right to set poles or structures and string lines, but leave title in the present owner and permit him to continue using the land.

Another policy put into effect by the Bonneville chief provides for purchase of property through voluntary agreement wherever possible. Condemnation suits, which involve court appearances and prolonged delays, will be avoided in the interest of getting each landowner his money as rapidly as possible, Dr. Raver said.

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"Condemnation will be resorted to only where rights to use the land cannot be acquired at reasonable prices, or where necessary to clear defective titles."

The new policy of acquiring easements instead of full title to the right-of-way will minimize the removal of property from tax rolls Dr. Raver pointed out. He also said it would permit the continued use of property for farming purposes, and would eliminate cutting individual tracts into. In the few cases which may require outright purchase of land for substation sites and similar purposes, sellers will be given the opportunity to remove houses, barns or other improvements, when not needed by the Project.

When The Lunch Bell Rings

The organized school lunch has gotten off to a better start this fall than at any time since young America began its annual tussle with the three R's.

One reason for this is the public consciousness that to develop the sound mind in the sound body, the citizen of tomorrow has to have good food and plenty of it, today and every day. Parents everywhere are showing interest in the health programs of the schools and watching the lunch rooms especially, knowing how much they do contribute to the health and the welfare of their children. Mary Schwartz Rose, Columbia University nutritionist, even goes so far as to say: "The machinery of education is wasted if it operates on a mind listless from hunger or befogged by indigestible food, whether the cause be carelessness, poverty, or ignorance."

Though hungry children are seldom about their food, the lunch room manager is always on the lookout for new ideas. To her the daily bill-of-fare is much more than just a way to take care of that "empty feeling." She puts all of the protective foods possible into the menu - milk, eggs, fruit and vegetables, whole-grain cereals - combined in endless different ways.

One day it may be a thick steaming soup with sandwiches to help stick to the ribs. In fact a milk soup is an ideal sandwich accompaniment especially in the winter school months. It seems to be even the always popular hot chocolate. Then there are the ever popular all-in-one hot dishes, combining vegetables with meats, eggs, or fish, and some such cereal as rice, cracked wheat, or corn meal. To the youngsters it's just food; it looks good, smells good, and tastes good. But the lunch room manager sees it in terms of long-time nutrition. She looks on each lunch as doing its little bit toward a diet giving children at least some of the food values they must have in order to develop strong bodies and alert minds.

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Must Obey Inspector

The first major trial developing from inspection work of the state department of agriculture, heard in the circuit court at St. Helens recently, resulted in a jury verdict against the defendant, a restaurant owner who assaulted an inspector as he went about his routine work for the department. The jury was out 30 minutes. The man was fined \$500.

In another late October trial, in which a Curry county woman was charged with larceny of livestock under the so-called gasoline cowboy law, a jury took 15 minutes to find the woman guilty, the department livestock investigation division reported. This case may be appealed.
