Thanksgiving Day Changed Before

November's last Thursday has not always been the established Thanksgiving day in Oregon, according to research of the Oregon Writers' Project of the W.P.A. The day was officially proclaimed for the first time in Oregon when John P. Gaines, territorial governor, set aside December 9, 1852 as a day for public Thanksgiving. Seven years later, when Oregon had attained statehood, Governor John Whiteaker designated December 29 as the day for Oregonians to observe Thanksgiving.

However, Thanksgiving day on the last Thursday in November was more or less an established date in Oregon when in 1893 Governor Penney set the observance a week ahead of the time announced by President Grover Cleveland. There are Oregonians who remember observing the day twice that year. To Penney also goes the honor of issuing the shortest Thanksgiving proclamation thus far recorded.

Hi-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

For safety's sake! Get plenty of Vitamin A. For goodness! Get vitamin A from butter, milk and the other delicious dairy products.

Statistics show us that automobile accidents at night cause three times as many deaths as those during the day, in proportion to the amount of traffic. One reason for this difference is a condition known as night blindness, caused directly by vitamin A deficiency. This means then - strange as it may seem - that vitamin A is of major importance in the picture of traffic safety.

The visual purple of the eye is a substance which is sensitive to light. When exposed to either daylight or bright artificial light, the visual purple is continually bleached. Medical research has shown that when the diet of an individual is lacking in sufficient vitamin A, the visual purple fails to regenerate properly, and difficulty in seeing at night results. On the other hand, when vitamin A is available, the visual purple is regenerated almost as rapidly as the light bleaches it.

Good brakes, good tires, careful automobile construction are all of importance in traffic safety. But the ability of the driver to see is equally important - if not more so. The driver must be able to adapt his vision in the dark rapidly to the glare of on-coming headlights. The pedestrian, too, is just as apt to suffer from night blindness as an automobile driver. Anyone who cannot see cars or other pedestrians quickly needs the vitamin A safety precaution as much as drivers do.

How much vitamin A is needed to give this safety protection? As a result of tests made on many individuals, nutritionists place the vitamin A requirement of the average adult at 4,000 or more International units each day. Approximately one half of the amount may be supplied by two ounces of butter which means about 4 pats. Almost one fourth of it may be easily included in one day's menu by one quart of milk. One ounce of cheese adds 750 units, and one serving of ice cream brings the possible daily total of more than 4,000 units from dairy products alone.

The yellow and green vegetables and eggs are also important sources of vitamin A and must not be overlooked when planning meals.

It's a good idea to be generous with butter in your cooking. Here is a recipe that not only will add much to your holiday puddings because of its goodness - but will help in building up the vitamin A needs of your family.

Orange Hard Sauce

Cream one third cup of butter with 1 cup of powdered sugar until smooth and fluffy. Add two teaspoons of orange juice and two teaspoons of grated orange rind.
