Far removed from dangerous bombing zones, Canada has become the training grounds for thousands of pilots Britain needs for her army. At Trenton, Ont., the Royal Canadian air force trains war birds by the hundreds. Upper left: Competent mechanics are necessary, so these boys make repairs on a motor while wearing gas masks. Sun Valley, Idaho.—Four new chalets, recently completed by the Union Pacific railroad to round out continental styled Sun Valley Village, will be "house warmed" by the more than 100 American and Canadian collegians enlivening Christmas week in connection with the second annual intercollegiate Ski competition, December 25 to January 1.

Concentration of the college skiers in the chalets serves the dual purpose of housing the lively but serious-minded younger winter sportsmen as a unit for training and releasing accommodations in Sun Valley lodge and the Challenger Inn for the general public.

Training of the college stars, including special instruction in competitive skiing, will be under the direction of Fried Pfeifer, head of the Sun Valley Ski School. The Intercollegiate Ski meet of four events for individual competition and two events for team competition is expected to attract the top-flight racers, cross-country runners and jumpers of 20 colleges from Dartmouth to the University of Washington.
