Moro State Bank Declares Dividend

This week the state bank examiner through the local liquidator, H. W. Champneys, announces a dividend of five percent to be paid the depositors of the Moro State Bank on December 22.

This payment brings to the depositors 85 percent of the money they had on hand at the time of the closing of the bank in 1931. Time for the distribution is fortunate in that the checks will be received just before Christmas.

The other Sherman county bank that went through the process of liquidation has recently been turned back to the stockholders after paying 100 percent to the depositors and interest to those who did not waive that interest.

It is possible that with a good crop and fortunate collections the same result may be obtained by the Moro bank.

in the northwest feeding will have to be done for the California market. If any large extension is made. A present feeding price is about equal to the milling price of wheat.

R. M. Evans, Administrator, speaking on a national wheat policy, said that while farmers were efficient in operation they were not so in regulating income. He reviewed the troubles of the post war period when despite an inability to collect war debts we loaned money to Europe so we could export farm products.

The probable rate of wheat production for the U. S. is around 62 million acres, he said and of this the surplus must be sold in competition with other nations. Crop yields are falling in the United States as agriculture grows older was one statement of the administrator. He spoke for a certificate plan for direct payment to farmers based on a farm allotment and estimated that the farmer would receive 11 cents from an eight cent loaf of bread.

Election of officers followed committee reports which will be reported at a later date. Carol Barker of Condon will be president for 1940, Sim Cully of Weston, vice-president, and Charles Smith, again secretary. Millard Eakin of Grass Valley was chosen as committeeman from Sherman county for the second year.

A larger number of Sherman countians attended the meeting than have gone to any league meeting outside of the county. Every section of the county was represented.
