## University Has Available Speakers

Symposium speakers from the University of Oregon speech department will present discussion programs before many of the service clubs, schools, lodges, and other civic organizations of the State of Oregon starting January 15, according to Professor Donald E. Hargis of the speech division.

The subjects which will be offered are, "Is the Cost of Distribution too High?", "Propaganda and Public Opinion in the United States," and "What is Wrong With Education?". The first two subjects will be discussed by men's groups, and the last by women.

In addition to the symposiums several radio plays will be available for presentation. Broadcasting technique and practice will also be shown. Members of the speech department faculty are also available to groups in need of speakers.

Request blanks are being sent to many organizations throughout the state in an effort to acquaint new clubs with the purposes of the discussions.

The purpose of the trip is to provide the students with a real audience, and to offer to the people of the state a chance to hear discussion of current problems.

Last year the symposium group addressed 110 audiences. This is the eighth year the speech department has sponsored the trips.
