Balanced Lenten Meals

With Lent comes the problem of preparing attractive daily meals that have zest and variety, and yet do not sacrifice that all-important matter of balance in their food value, for upon this depends the health of the entire family.

The homemaker must always remember that husband coming home from the office and the children tired after a day at school are far more enticed by an appetizing array of attractive foods than by a careful nutritive balance. Carefully she must combine these two elements. New combinations and arrangements of foods, new ideas and different forms of presenting it are doubly important at this time to keep the Lenten menu from becoming monotonous.

Since meat is a high protein food, if it is left out of the diet the homemaker must be sure to make up the quota with other high protein foods. She has milk and cheese to choose from, sea foods of all kinds, eggs and legumes—a large group of foods that offer endless possibilities for meatless dishes that are appetizing and satisfying.

Cheese has many nutritional qualities which recommend its frequent use but becomes more important during Lent, because it can substitute for meat so satisfactorily. Eggs are important, too, in Lenten cookery and a combination of eggs and cheese form a basis for many delicious dishes. Two recipes suitable for main dishes and combining cheese and eggs are given here:

Golden Fleece

One-half pound full-cream yellow cheese
Five eggs
One teaspoon salt
One cup cream

Put the cheese in a buttered baking dish and place in a warm oven (300 degrees) until cheese is soft. Add the cream and blend with a fork until smooth and creamy. Break the eggs over the top of the cheese mixture. Sprinkle with salt and a dash of pepper. Cover the casserole and place in oven at moderate temperature until the whites of the eggs are firm. Dot with butter and serve at once.

Cheese Casserole

Six slices bread
One-half pound cheese, thinly sliced
Two eggs
One cup milk
One-half teaspoon salt
One-eighth teaspoon pepper

Put two slices of bread in bottom of a buttered casserole, cover with one-half the cheese. Place on this two slices of bread; cover with remaining cheese. Top with two slices of buttered bread. Beat eggs; add milk, salt and pepper; pour over cheese and bread. Bake in slow oven (300 degrees) about thirty minutes. Serve immediately.
