4.9 Percent of OSC Students are Married

Married students now enrolled at Oregon State college total 247 or 4.9 percent of the entire enrollment, according to a study being made in the school of home economics there. The same study shows 229 married students at the University of Oregon, which is 6.3 percent of the enrollment.

At the college 202 men and 45 women are continuing their education after marriage. Preliminary reports show the average age of the married men to be about 25, and of the women 23. Married students are enrolled fairly evenly throughout the institution, although engineering and home economics appear to have a slight edge in numbers.

Frisco Fair Funds Voted By State

San Francisco, Cal. Feb. 29—Backed by an appropriation of \$350,000 by the state legislature, bringing California's financial participation to nearly \$1,000,000, the 1940 season of the Golden Gate International Exposition will beyond doubt be the finest fair the west has ever produced.

This was the unanimous opinion expressed by exposition officials when appraised of the new appropriation.

Under the terms of the measure setting up the new finances, the sum of \$100,000 is to be earmarked to aid county exhibits, and a further sum of \$65,000 is set aside for special awards.
