USDA To Assist In Insect Control

The bureau of entomology and plant quarantine of the USDA will assist with control of grass hoppers and Mormon crickets in Oregon under the same agreement as last year, reports the director of agriculture following a conference between the state and federal departments and the state college. About 25,000 acres more than in 1939-will be baited under the program now outlined but subject to appropriation of funds by congress.

Director Mickle warns that now is the time to begin baiting on crickets, for warm days will bring their first appearance. At present the infestation in this state is confined to eastern and south central Oregon.

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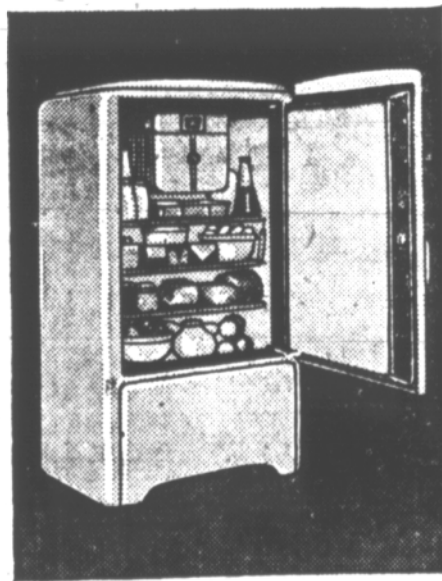
