### Presbyterians Hold Annual Meeting

The annual congregational meeting of the community church was held in the church Wednesday night. About 60 people sat down to dinner after which the regular business was taken up. H. B. Pinkerton, chairman, presided and G. A. Williams acted as clerk. All bills were met and there were encouraging balances in each of the funds. About \$1764.00 were spent by the organizations for local work and \$266.00 for benevolent objects. The Sunday school reported an increase of 17, or 15 percent gain. The Missionary society reported a membership of 39, a net gain of 50 percent over the previous year. Among special features of the year was the organization of the senior choir with over 20 voices under the leadership of Mrs. Russel Hollinshead with Mrs. Martin Melzer at the piano. The young people have been meeting at the homes of the people the last three months with increased attendance and interest. Three girls were sent to the Hillcock conference last summer, while the two weeks vacation Bible school had an enrollment of 45 with an average of 34. The average attendance for the morning worship services for the year was 73 and for the Sunday school 66.

The budget for the coming year was set at \$1792 an increase of \$177. This involves the building of a choir room to the right of the pulpit, work on which will probably start in a few weeks. The auditorium was kalsomined about Christmas time and the basement will be gone over in the next few days. All departed with the spirit of "hopefulness as to larger things to be attempted next year.

Russel Belshee, pianists Ardis Truitt and Norma Melzer, secretary Pauline Davis, treasurer Dewey Thompson, cradle roll Mrs. Martha Cope. Trustee for three years S. A. In the young people society Lois Melzer is president, Carrel Bennett vice president, and Gene Brisbine secretary treasurer Karl Melzer has charge of the junior society and Florence Lawrence of the little folks. In the Missionary society Mrs. Henry G. Hansen is president, Mrs. Dewey Thompson, vice president, Mrs. E. E. Barzee treasurer and Mrs. Cope secretary. The local women's organization works through a committee with Mrs. E. H. Moore as president assisted by Mrs. Carroll Sayers and Mrs. Margaret Peetz.
