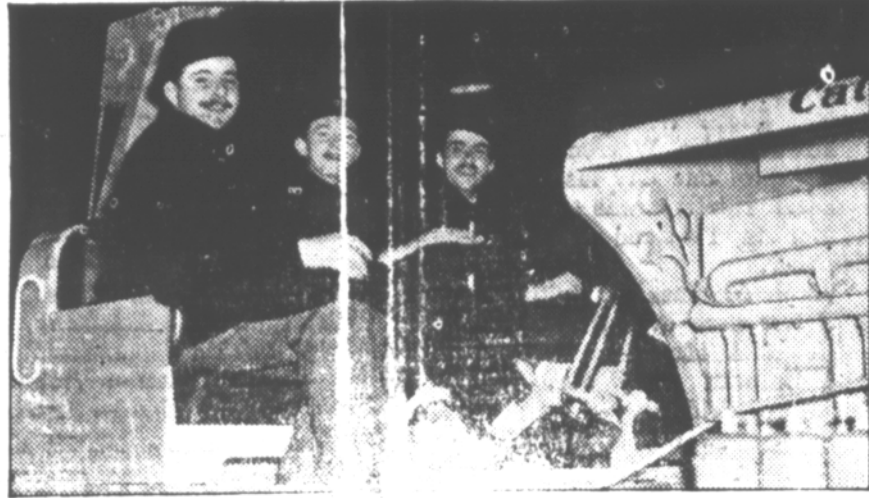

### Hi-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

This is the time of year when most everyone experiences a certain restlessness. Anxious for the warm days of spring we find ourselves eagerly plunging into plans for spring house cleaning, the remodeling and cleaning of spring clothes, or more exciting, actual new additions to the home or the wardrobe.

Along with all of this preparation for spring, family menus should not be overlooked for this is the season when the home maker needs to spring clean her menus as well as the cupboard shelves.

Although it is possible to plan menus the year around to include enough minerals and vitamins, and thereby avoiding the old complaint of 'spring fever', it is not always done. The touch of spring fever you are experiencing may be just the change of weather, and then again it may mean that you have not been eating your quota of the protective foods—vegetables, fruits, and dairy products. And so spring clean your menus. The early green vegetables that are appearing in the markets, tender green asparagus, greens of various kinds, and the pink stalks of rhubarb confirm this change of seasons.

Rhubarb to most of us is one of the best spring tonics. It is classed along in food value with greens of all kinds, as beet tops, turnip tops, dandelions and spinach, although it is usually used as a fruit. Although rhubarb sauce and rhubarb pie are always favorites, there are many other ways of preparing it that give more food value to your menus.

Here are two rhubarb desserts, served with cream, that will give a spring time atmosphere.

Scalloped Rhubarb 3 cups chopped rhubarb 1-4 cups sugar

- 2 cups bread crumbs 1 orange rind and juice 1-4 tsp cinnamon 1-4 tsp nutmeg 1-4 cup water 2 tbsp butter 1-2 pt. whipped cream

Melt the butter and add the crumbs; mix the sugar, spice and orange rind. Place one fourth of the crumbs in bottom of buttered baking dish, then one half of the rhubarb. Sprinkle with one half of the sugar and spice. Repeat. Sprinkle orange juice and water over the top and put the rest of the crumbs on top. Cover closely bake 45 minutes in a 400 degree oven. Uncover the last 10 minutes to brown. Serve with whipped cream.

Rhubarb Betty

1 lb. diced rhubarb 1 cup coarse graham cracker crumbs. 1-2 cup sugar 1-4 tsp nutmeg 2 tbsp butter Mix together the crumbs, and nutmeg. Arrange in a buttered casserole two layers each of rhubarb, dots of butter and the mixture, finishing with the crumbs. Bake in moderate oven 350 deg. about 35 minutes or until rhubarb is done and crumbs are browned. Serve with cream.
