HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

To most children a cook is as good as the dessert she produces. Not that the average child won't do justice to well cooked food of any kind, but dishes such as 'Moms shortcakes or her puddings are the ones that they boast about to their companions and the ones that will help them through the meal without lagging because of its satisfactory ending.

Grown ups, too, reserve special critical judgment for desserts. And, whether they say so or not, most of them are disappointed if the meal ends without one or if the dessert turns out to be something commonplace.

And so it seems that everyone possesses, to some degree at least the proverbial sweet tooth, and to satisfy this sweet tooth desserts have been given a definite place in menu planning. As in everything else there can be good and bad planning of desserts.

Excluding the vegetables, this protective group of foods is a gold mine when it comes to planning healthful and satisfactory desserts. Here is a new and unusual cup cake recipe that should be a sure fire hit with your family and (although they needn't know it) is nutritious too, because of the milk butter, fruits and eggs in them.

Pineapple Cup Cakes
2-1 4 cups flour
2-1 2 tsp baking powder
1-2 tsp salt
1-2 cup butter
1-1 3 cups sugar
1 cup milk
3 egg whites
2-3 cup crushed pineapple, drained
Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cream butter, add sugar gradually and beat until light and fluffy. Add sifted flour alternately with the liquid. Fold in the beaten egg whites. Fill small buttered muffin pans two-thirds full, bake at 400 degrees about 20 minutes. When cool, cover with coconut frosting.

Coconut Frosting
2 cups powdered sugar
4 tbsp butter
1 egg, 1 tsp vanilla
1 cup shredded coconut
Sift the powdered sugar and

gradually add to the butter, which has been beaten until creamy and light. Beat in egg and vanilla. Let stand in the top of double boiler over hot water 10 minutes. Beat until cool and of the right consistency to spread. Frost the cakes and roll them in the coconut.

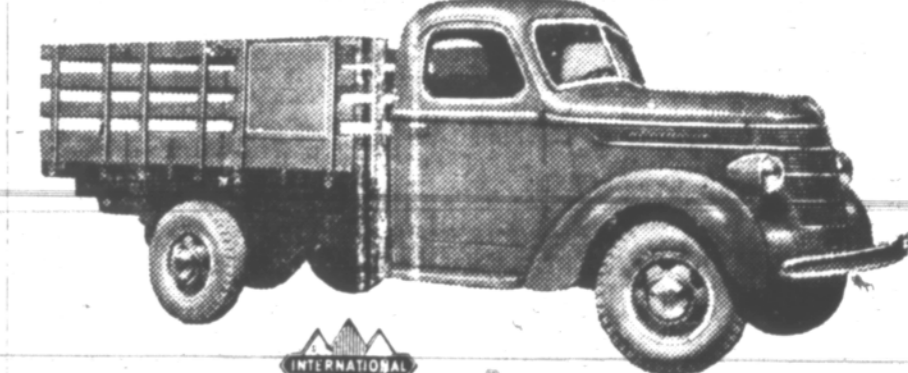
