### Typical Accident Involves Walker

The typical fatal traffic accident in Oregon during the year 1939 occurred on Sunday in a rural area between 7 and 8 p.m. involved a pedestrian over 55 years of age who was crossing a highway with the weather clear and road surface dry. The car was going straight ahead and the driver had six years or more experience.

This picture of the typical traffic fatality is contained in the booklet "Oregon Traffic Accident Facts," published each year by Earl Snell secretary of state, as a phase of his state wide campaign for traffic safety.

The booklet will be distributed to safety councils, city officials, schools, newspaper editors and others who desire compact, organized information on the 1939 traffic situation in Oregon.

Statistics on the number of accidents, injuries and deaths for the 36 counties in Oregon and for the principal cities and towns are included in the booklet. A map of Oregon shows the counties which are "in the pink" of condition as far as improvement in traffic fatality records are concerned. Those counties are Clatsop, Columbia, Multnomah, Tillamook, Marion, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Umatilla, Union, Baker, Grant, Curry and Josephine.

### Feeding Wheat Bring Dividends

Oregon wheat fed to Oregon steers at the Oregon experiment station in Corvallis, this past winter was "sold" at the rate of \$1.50 a bushel or more than \$50 a ton. When allowance was made for labor or costs in feeding and for interest on investment, the steers still paid out at rate of \$10 a ton for oats and vetch hay used, and \$30 a ton, or 90 cents a bushel, for the wheat.

Reports of the results of this feeding trial were made at the annual steer feeders' day at the experiment station. The 16 head of baby beefs fed throughout the winter were shown to the visitors. All the animals were sleek and fat and

apparently in condition to top the market.

The wheat used in the feeding experiment was part of that supplied to the experiment station by the Agricultural Adjustment administration to research purposes. It was obtained largely through the efforts of N. E. Dodd, western director of the AAA, and members of the Oregon congressional delegation.

"Results obtained in this feeding test here at the college were highly significant and indicate a possibility of a greatly increased industry in fattening Oregon livestock on Oregon wheat," says William A. Schoenfeld, dean and director of agriculture. "Other tests are being made at the branch stations in various parts of the state with the wheat, results of which will soon

be made available." B. W. Rodenwold, assistant professor in animal husbandry, who is in charge of the actual feed work, reported that the steers used in the experiment were grade Herefords, bought on the Portland market last fall for \$7.25 a hundred. They were fed from five to six pounds of ground wheat per head per day, in addition to the hay. Analyses showed that this wheat contained 3 to 5 per cent more nutrients than the ordinary feeding grade of corn and barley.

The economic possibilities of such feeding were brought out by P. M. Brandt, head of the animal industries division, who said that Oregon produces a surplus of both feeder cattle and wheat, while Washington and California must import large quantities of beef.
