Mrs. Earl Capuro of Gold Hill, Nevada came Thursday night to spend a month visiting with her sister, Mrs. A. J. Bucholtz.

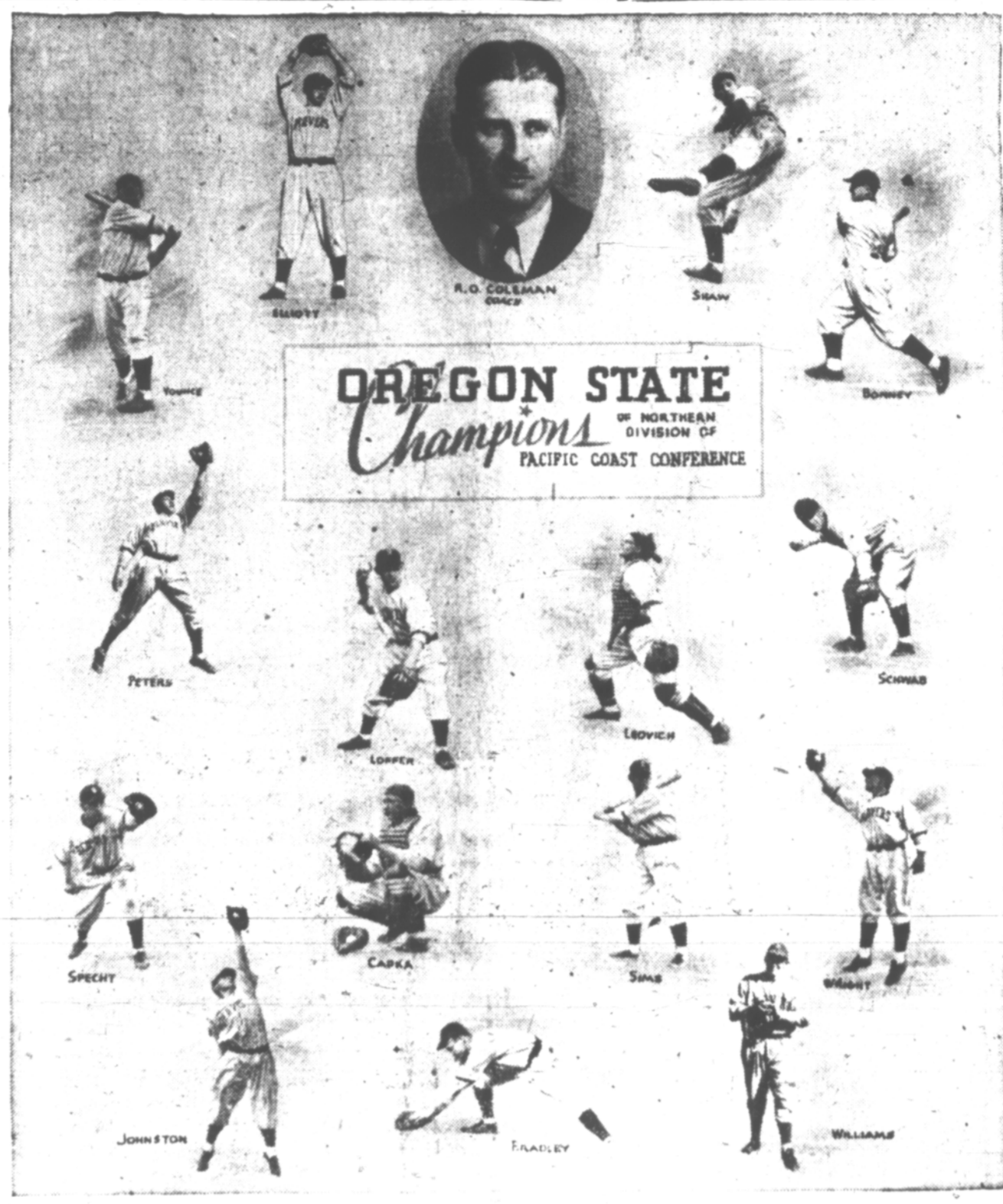
John Ryan and family were here from Lexington and John Searcy and family from Hillsboro over the holiday.
