LET'S USE DEMOCRACY

As Simp O'Dill's bewhiskered boss often remarks, "I tank you crazy." This nation shows signs of going slightly ga-ga over the war situation. Certainly this nation wants the allies to win, certainly it appears necessary that we be better armed. That doesn't excuse so much jumping up and down and hollering as has been going on in Washington.

It may here be doubted if the new move to declare much of our obsolete and ammunition and planes obsolete and selling them to the allies will be considered proper when we stop and think a few minutes. If this material is obsolete it isn't worth taking across the ocean; if it isn't obsolete it isn't practically an act of war. It might be much better to actually declare war and go to war facing its possibilities than to back into war while making excuses ourselves.

There is also a lot of bunk about retaining, or trying to retain, the screwball legislation that has been foisted on the country of late years. Certainly that part of it that is desirable and has public support and can be made to work, and which the country can afford will be retained, war or no war. That part of it that was made to glorify the new deal or to exercise hate against a certain class will be put out of existence war or no war.

We will feed those who cannot feed themselves. We always did. When we come to our senses we will provide work through normal channels for those who can work, and get rid of this nonsense of public responsibility for everyone's rations, everyone's clothes, everyone's house. Then we won't have to be so concerned about everyone's income.

In the meantime there is a distressing number of people who have thrown up their hands and are apparently resigned to leaving the management of the country in the hands of an administration that has neglected armament, piled up debt and increased dependents; resigned to permitting our needed industrial development for armament purposes left to the direction of those who have fought industry and boasted of conquests of business.

We are not at war. We are at peace and probably will remain so. Our philosophy of government and of public and private morals is threatened by the so far successful dictators. That is no reason why we should permit dictatorship here now. We do not need dictatorship of bureaus or of men. Public criticism is still a public service. What the people want may still be done if they express themselves. It is a time for clear thinking and not for emotional bally-hoo.

Sit down and think: don't stand up and yell.

WHEAT PRICE

With every new conquest of the dictator countries a market for wheat is removed. As the supplies of our grain are piled up in country warehouses and terminal elevators in anticipation of another crop, we can well wonder what the warring nations are going to eat with this much of their supplies cut off. We might also wonder where and how we are going to get rid of our wheat.

Really the situation for the sale of wheat does not look very bright. Our export market has been reduced to almost nothing in the past few years and still its complete loss will make quite a difference.

A hope might lay in the fact that the armament program will increase employment and may make a better domestic market for our grain. The intense desire of this administration to promote trade with South America may lead to larger imports of grain from Argentina to make this source of increase not feasible, however.

Certainly there is nothing to make the observer believe that the price of wheat will raise or even that it will hold its own. The fren-

ty for armaments may put the nation in such shape that it will no longer find it possible to pay a bonus for taking land out of production. With markets cut off this would be a boubly serious for wheat farmers.

No doubt the rearmament program will get the blame for the higher taxes but so far it is only to blame for about a tenth of the increase in national debt.

If blumling Benito had studied for fifty years to make himself the most hated, the least respected man in the universe, he couldn't have done better. Neither side can consider him in case of victory, no one can sympathize with him in case of defeat.

Congressional permission for the president to call out the army would be something beyond its control to give. After all, there are some rights even congress cannot give away. The people rule in this land.

Some one—and we suspicion the woman—has been doing a lot of work in the Wasco city park. It has been transformed from a rather desolate and barren vacant lot into a green clad, tree bearing plot that would be a credit to a larger town in a more favorable location for lawns and trees.

Saturday, June 25th, will be field day at the Moro Experiment Station. Every person interested will be given an opportunity during the afternoon that day to inspect the experimental plots and hear the work fully explained.

From the Observer June 16, 1911 The picnic at DeMoss park Saturday was a great success. At least 250 people were present.

Mr. and Mrs. Anson Woods of Walla Walla, who have been in the county since the funeral of Mrs. Coleman, have returned to their home.

The silver cornet band of Moro has been engaged for the Pioneer picnic at DeMoss Springs July 4th.

From the Observer June 17, 1921

The Sherman Electric Company loaded and dispatched three large truck loads of camp and commissary supplies on Monday to their camp three miles west of Dufur where active operations have been returned. A number of poles are to be set in that vicinity and then wire will begin to be placed for the high power line into Sherman county. Manager Roy Dean estimates that within two months all points will be supplied with light and power from the company lines.

Mrs. E. R. Hickson left this week for Portland where she will visit her two sons, Jack and Robert, and their families.

DeMoss Springs Chautauqua dates this year are July 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7.

With approximately 4500 yards of rock yet to crush and spread, the road gang seems to have a fairly long time yet to work. Up to Saturday morning 1100 yards had been spread out of the 6000 contracted for Moro work.

The Tamalum Lumber Co. is building a series of bins along the railroad track, in their Moro yard. When finished four will be used for coal and one a combination lime, plaster and cement bin.

Statehouse Gossip

Dewey with 1842 votes to his credit topped the list of write-in candidates as running mate for Oregon's favorite son, Chas. L. McNary. McNary who received this state's endorsement for presidential honors was also given 1029 write in votes for vice president. Other Republican write in candidates for vice president in the order of their standing were Sheridan Downey, Robert Taft, Herbert Hoover, Arthur Vandenberg, Robert M. LaFollette and Wendell Wilkie.

Democratic voters bound their delegates to support Robert M. LaFollette for the vice presidential nomination writing in 2416 votes for the Wisconsin senator. Louis Johnson assistant secretary of war was runner up for vice presidential honors on the Democratic ticket with 2121 votes. Other candidates receiving support on the Democratic ticket for vice president included John N. Garner, James Farley, Cordell Hull, Sheridan Downey, Paul McNutt, Burton Wheeler and C. L. McNary.

No indictments were returned by the Marion county grand jury which concluded its investigations of the state forestry department this week but former state forester J. W. Ferguson came in for severe reproof for inefficiency and unbusiness like procedure in the handling of certain of the funds under his care. While the grand jury found nothing illegal in the manner in which the funds were handled its report declared that the procedure under which the funds were administered "is conducive to waste and inefficiency."

Members of Oregon's 249th Coast Artillery regiment who went into intensive training at Camp Clatsop this week will be called upon to defend the mouth of the Columbia river from simulated attack by an enemy force, according to Major General George A. White. The newly organized anti aircraft unit will get their first opportunity to fire the new anti aircraft guns in practice against targets towed behind army airplanes. The powerful searchlights with which these new units are equipped will stab the ether far above the earth in search of invading planes. The 4000 Oregon guardsmen in the infantry regiments and other units of the 41st Division in this state will go to Fort Lewis, Washington August 4, for 21 days of intensive training with troops from other states of the northwest.

The Salem Lions club which several years ago adopted the state school for blind as its particular project has already started a drive for a new fire proof building to replace the frame building now used as a class room at that institution. Aid of other Lions clubs throughout the state will be sought in support of a measure providing for the improvement which will be presented to the next legislature.

Attorney General VanWinkle has ruled that a man who raises bees for a living is actually a farmer and as such is entitled to the use of an exempt farmer's license for his truck. The attorney general who several ears ago ruled against apiarists as farmers was convinced of the error of his way when J. D. Mickle, state director of agriculture, produced records of the state college to show that bees are largely responsible for the pollination of farm crops crops valued at \$12,868,738 a year in this state.

Mrs. Ickes Hostess at Indian Art Show



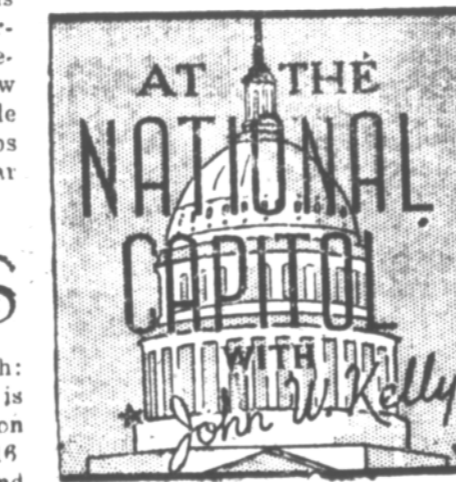
