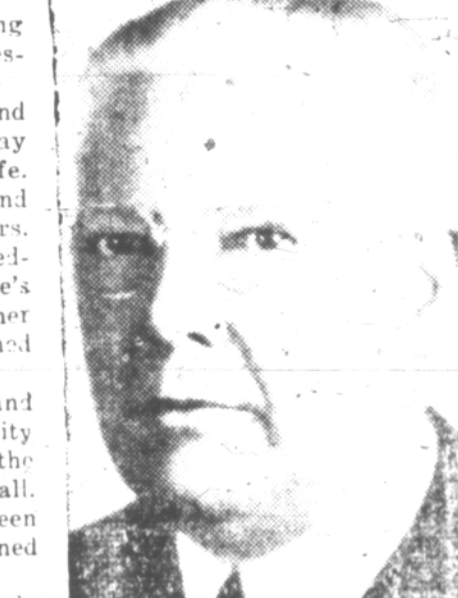
"Don't they teach you to salute in your company?" roared the major to Patrick Malone, who had passed him without raising his hand.
