CHICAGO FASTER NOW MAKES FASTER TIME

Portland, Ore., June 25.—Beginning June 28, the Union Pacific's Portland Rose will go on a faster schedule to Denver, Kansas City and the territory reached through these gateways, it was announced today by J. C. Cumming, general passenger agent.

Under the new time, arrival at Denver will be at 8:50 a. m. instead of 10:30 a. m. and arrival at Kansas City at 9 p. m. instead of 7:25 a. m. the following day. This reduces the time, Portland to Denver, by 1 hour, 40 minutes; and the time, Portland to Kansas City is reduced 10 hours, 25 minutes.

Coming west, the Portland Rose will practically adhere to its present schedule except that arrival at Portland will be 15 minutes earlier, at 7:20 a. m. instead of 7:35 a. m., which will also be the new arrival time of The Spokane, the overnight train from Spokane to Portland.

New Taxes Start On July 1st

J. W. Maloney, Collector of Internal Revenue, stated today that all wholesale and retail dealers in cigarettes would be subject to payment of a floor tax, based on the increase in the tax on cigarettes under the Revenue Act of 1940. The new law becomes effective July 1, 1940.

Collector Maloney said that all dealers having cigarettes for sale must make an inventory of their stock on hand as of the close of business June 30, 1940. This is to be prepared in duplicate, listing brands and quantities of each brand. It is to be held by the dealer, and he is to notify the Collector of Internal Revenue, 210 Custom House, immediately, requesting a form on which to file the floor-tax return. As soon as the printed floor-tax returns are received from the Bureau at Washington, they will be mailed to dealers, with instructions as to preparation; computation of tax, etc.

This floor tax would be due from all proprietors of hotels, restaurants, confectioneries, grocery stores, lunch counters, pool halls, cigar stores, news stands, retail liquor dealers, retail dealers in beer, and any other person or firm selling cigarettes.
