A group of young people motored to Maryhill Sunday. Going were June Hines, Thelma Lutje, Charles Hartman and Patty O'Meara.

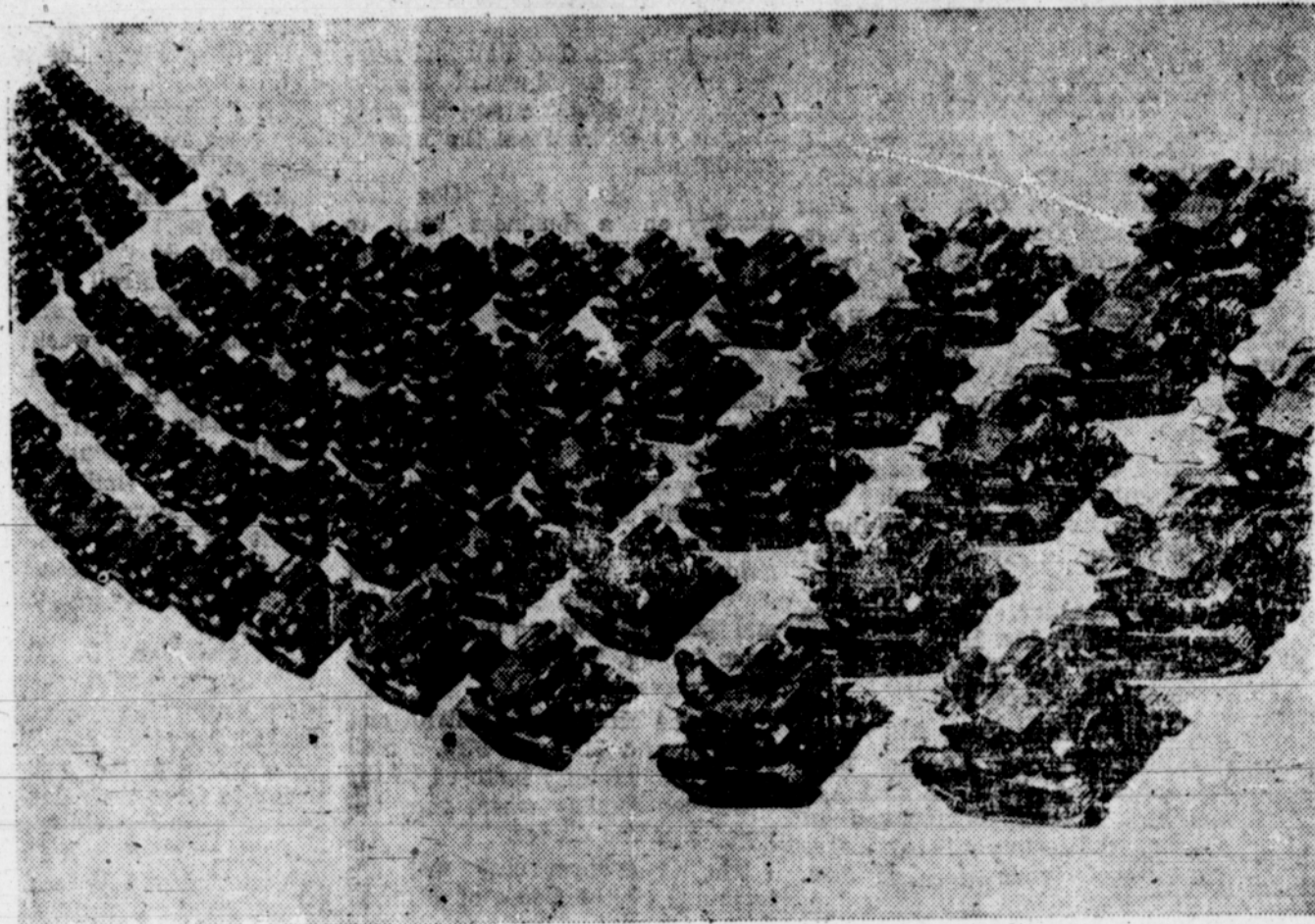
Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Nisbet and Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Funk spent Sunday at Wilson park.

There are at least a dozen different ways to tantalize summer appetites during the berry season. Strawberries are on the wane now, but other berries take up the theme where strawberries leave off. There is no other section of the country where there is the variety of berries to choose from as in our own state. Raspberries, loganberries, blackberries,

boysen berries, youngberries, follow each other in quick order and with their short season the home maker should be on the watch and make the most of them.

While not particularly high in nutritive value, berries in general contain vitamin C and some kinds are important sources of this vitamin. To make the most of the vitamin C in berries, it's best to eat them uncooked.

Berry time is short cake time. Any of the sweet, juicy berries are suitable for short cake. It's best to let them stand with sugar for an hour or so to draw out the juice and to spread them on the cake just before serving. The

short biscuit cake is our special favorite although the sponge and angel food seem to come in for honors too. For a hot day, fresh berries and ice cream atop a crisp waffle makes a luscious and satisfying shortcake.

Frozen desserts made of most any of the berries are easy to make and such fun to serve for they are popular with everyone. Raspberries are especially good in ice cream and raspberries, boysenberry, blackberry or current juice is good for milk sherbets. Or if you buy your ice cream, use sweetened over the top for delicious sundaes.

Among the old fashioned favorites, freshly ripened berries and cream perhaps top the list. Have cream that is thick enough to coat each berry and powdered sugar for those who like it. In looking over old recipes we find this pudding which merits a trial. Quick Berry Pudding
One quart berries
One cup of sugar

One-half cup of water
One-half teaspoon of salt
Two cups soft bread crumbs
Two tablespoons melted butter
One tablespoon lemon juice, if desired
Pick over the berries, wash, drain, mix with sugar, water, and salt and boil for 5 minutes. Combine the bread crumbs and butter, add to the hot fruit, stir until well mixed and let stand on the back of the stove for about 30 minutes (low or stored heat to you) but do not let the pudding cook. Add the lemon juice and serve the pudding while still warm with plain cream.

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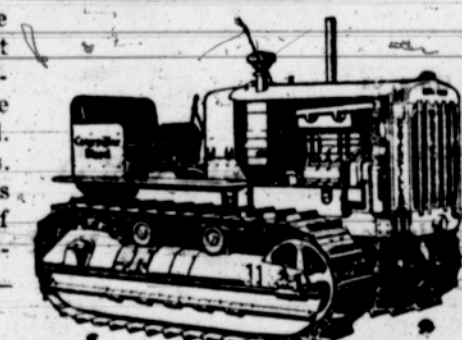
