Orange Egg Punch

One egg - One tablespoon sugar
Dash of salt
One fourth cup orange juice
One cup of milk

Beat the egg until light and add sugar and salt. Add the orange juice. Mix thoroughly and slowly add the milk. Serve very cold.

Prune-Ade

One half cup of prune juice
One teaspoon of lemon juice
Two tablespoons sugar
Pinch of salt - One cup milk

Dissolve the sugar and salt in the prune and lemon juice and chill. When ready to serve, pour into the cold milk and mix well. Serve immediately.

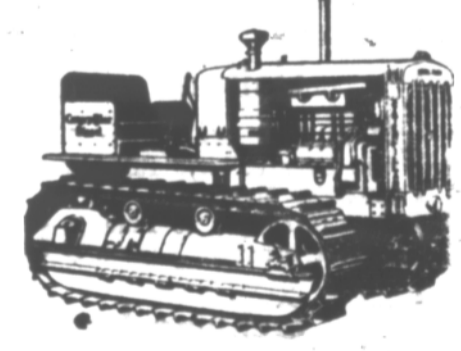
