Teutsch, Smith Raised In Rank At College

In a reorganization of the extension service administration at Oregon State college, made necessary by the elevation of Frank L. Ballard to the presidency, the state board of higher education has just approved the appointment of W. L. Teutsch, formerly assistant county agent leader, to be assistant director of extension, effective at once. C. W. Smith, also an assistant county agent leader, was promoted to county agent leader.

The arrangement just confirmed by the board abolishes the title of vice-director, held by Ballard, and instead, Besse and Teutsch become assistant directors of the experiment station and extension service, respectively, and E. E.

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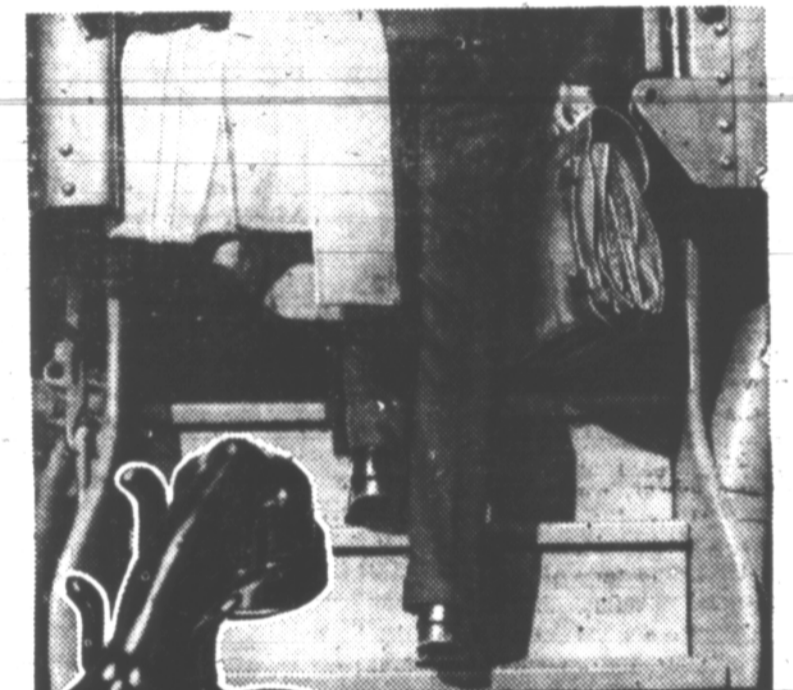
See through Glass Car
