Basques Are Odd Immigrants

The Basques in the remote hills of southeastern Oregon are the most interesting and picturesque of all Oregon's ethnic groups. They crossed the sea and a continent from the Pyrenees of Spain to find in the wild Steens Mountains the conditions suitable for raising sheep, the ancient calling of the old-world Basques.

Stories differ as to how the Basques happened to settle in Oregon. According to one version a Basque sea captain came to San Francisco in the 1880's and found his way up through Winnemucca to the grazing region. He remained to make a fortune and then returned to his native home in Spain to tell of the great sheep country in Oregon. Another account tells of young Basques who entered the country by the way of Ellis Island and drifted across the country until they found a location most like their native home.

The Basques are a gay people, playing the guitar, accordion or harp, dancing and singing. When not at work they are likely to be found around the village plaza engaged in pastimes that bring the atmosphere of old Spain to the Oregon wilderness.
