HI-WAYS TO HEALTH by ADA R. MAYNE OREGON DAIRY COUNCIL

School bells are ringing in all parts of Oregon again and with them is the hustle and bustle that goes with the change of routine after the long summer vacation. With long hours of play in the sunshine most every child has a ravenous appetite and mother has had little to worry about in that respect. But with the excitement and hurry of school days it may be somewhat different. If the child does not eat the amount of food for breakfast that is necessary for a growing, active body it results in over fatigue toward the end of the morning session and lack of appetite for lunch. And dinner can't make up for these two lost meals.

It is relatively easy to outline a good breakfast but it is of course difficult to get these breakfasts eaten. One of the chief reasons for this, of course, is the hurry that possesses most households in the morning. The first step then in securing better breakfasts for children is to work for earlier bedtimes at night. To remove the sense of pressure and hurry will do much in developing in them a normal appetite for this important meal.

Serving children adequate breakfasts will result in greatly increased school efficiency and general physical improvement. If good breakfasts are combined with more adequate milk and fruit consumption, and with earlier bedtimes and more actual hours of sleep, the results will be striking.

In planning good breakfasts for children it is usually assumed that this meal should supply approximately one third of the food requirements for the day. Include fruit in some form, some staying food, as cereal or bread, and milk. The rest of the meal may be planned

according to the needs of the family. Although variety in the breakfast menu does not seem as necessary as for other meals, it can be achieved by giving the same careful consideration of it that is usually given to luncheon and dinner. With the countless ways of serving fruits, cereals, eggs and milk it need not be the monotonous meal it often is.

Here is a suggestion for serving eggs a bit different and may be used either in a breakfast or luncheon menu.

Baked Eggs au Gratin

Four eggs

Two and a half cups small bread crumbs

Five tablespoons milk

Grated American cheese

Add milk to the bread crumbs.

Sprinkle with salt and pepper.

Make ring of cubes inside four ramekins. Sprinkle with grated American cheese. Drop egg in center of each. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg.) 15 minutes. Serve immediately. Serves four.

Hood River Men Get First Money

First benefit payments for compliance with the agricultural conservation practices in the 1940 program have been made approximately a month earlier this year than was the case last year, according to reports from the state office from Corvallis.

The first to receive checks this year went to 16 Hood River county farmers who had earned payments averaging \$28.77, although approximately 42 per cent of this had been pledged in advance as payment for phosphate fertilizer. More rapid checking of compliance in the counties, making possible earlier filing of applications, as well as improved methods of office handling, are responsible for the earlier distribution of payments this year, according to state officials.
