Price Outlook Now Better

A more favorable outlook for the 1940-41 marketing season than for the longer period is the general prospect for poultry, dairy and livestock products, according to the annual outlook report for these farm products just published by the Oregon State college extension service. One of the principal favorable factors is the relatively strong domestic demand situation which is expected to prevail through much or all of the 1940-41 marketing year.

Supplies of eggs and pork are not expected to be as large during the year ahead as during the past marketing season, but the volume of dairy products, beef and lamb is expected to hold up around that of the past year. Cattle numbers, both dairy and beef, are increasing enough to make the outlook ahead less favorable for dairy products and beef. Future price trends, while indefinite owing to war, are likely to be adverse if the cattle sales operate as in the past.

The report contains sections on feeds and costs, demand, and several tables of data of value to producers in planning their production and marketing operations. A copy may be had free from county agents or direct from the college.

With respect to the wheat outlook for 1941-42, the supply of wheat for 1940-41, which will affect the carry over into 1941-42, is even larger than was indicated a month ago. Nearly 23 million bushels were added to the 1940 wheat crop estimate owing to favorable growing conditions for spring wheat during August. With the carry over last July 1 at 284 million bushels and production estimated at 784 million, the total

supply is now indicated at 1,068 million bushels, approximately 60 million greater than last year.

The report contains comments on several other farm products of importance in Oregon.
