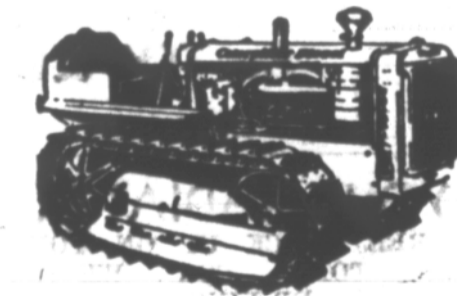

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BONNEVILLE POWER SLATED FOR BEND

Bonneville-Grand Coulee Power Administrator, Paul J. Rayer, announced today he had authorized preliminary surveys for the location of a 125-mile power transmission line from The Dalles to Bend and Redmond, Oregon.

Field reconnaissance work will start in the near future.

Plans call for the design and location of a wood pole line to be energized at 66,000 volts. It will receive power at a substation to be located at The Dalles, which will be fed by the power administration's 115,000-volt Bonneville Hood River-Dalles circuit. Contracts for construction of the Bonneville Dalles line will be awarded in a few days.

Aerial reconnaissance will constitute first work in the Bend-Redmond survey. This will be followed

ed by ground survey parties, which will establish temporary offices at various points along the route.
