Wednesday's trading on around 500 cattle and 35 calves was slow and generally 25c lower on kinds offered. Some cows were 50c lower, and top vealers \$1.00 lower than Monday's best sales.

Monday's best prices were generally steady compared with last Monday, with truck-ins 10c lower than late last week. Good to choice

170 to 215 lb truck-ins sold from \$6.35 to \$6.50, with the bulk at \$6.40. Carlots again made \$6.60. Fatheers weighing 225 to 270 lb went at \$5.75 to \$5.90, with some in the rail section at \$6.10. Packing sows moved at \$4.50 to \$5.00. Feeder pigs were mainly \$5.00 to \$5.50.

Wednesday's hog market was active and around 10c higher, best truck-ins selling up to \$6.60, with the bulk around \$6.50.

Monday's prices in sheep alleys ruled steady to strong, with the extreme top on fat lambs 25c higher, good to choice lambs headed at \$8.25 to \$8.50, with two loads of good weight quality lambs at \$8.75. Medium to good lambs made \$7.50 to \$8.00. Shorn lambs moved from \$7.75 down to \$7.50, with medium grades around \$7.25 to \$7.50. Good slaughter lambs up to \$3.50, with a few odd lots of outstanding kinds at \$4.00 to \$4.50.

Monday's wool prices were generally steady compared with last Monday, with truck-ins 10c lower than late last week. Good to choice
