Wheat Exports Dwindle

What effect, if any, the government's cessation of shipment of subsidized wheat to Japan will have on the movement of grain from this state will be reflected in the statistical report of the state department of agriculture division of grain inspection for October. Meantime, the September inspections of incoming grain included 1,062,621 bushels of wheat, of which 89,481 bushels arrived by river boat. September, 1939, inspections of wheat were 1,008,571 bushels.

Export shipments of wheat last month were only 1,588 bushels, all of which went to the Philippines. Export inspections a year previous were 87,173 bushels.

Coastal shipments of wheat totaled 24,929 bushels, all destined for California. The grain division sampled 4,586 sacks of seed shipped to the east coast, of which nearly a third or 1,470 bushels was hairy vetch.

Of the 166,667 barrels of flour inspected for the month, 132,550 were being shipped to the Orient.

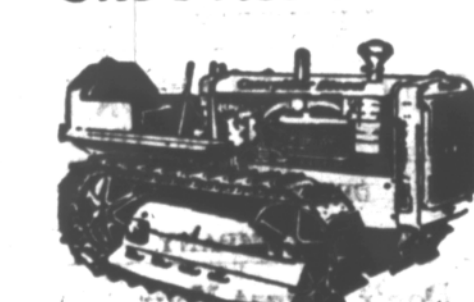
