Continued from page one. Many of them must have been here, like sentinals set to guard family integrity, for generations, and they will remain for years to come. Iowa farmers do not live in gay little houses of cream stucco. They live in big white houses with a Bible in the front room. And one feels, even in driving by, that here is stability and strength and dependability and that America would be safe with these people.

Nebraska and the River Plate: herds of cattle clustering around the feed lots for the early winter feeding. Acres and Acres of alfalfa corn. Wyoming with endless vistas of sagebrush, Idaho and irrigated land from one side to the other. Children, lots of them, and many of foreign ancestry.

Roads are much the same as in Oregon. Many states have signs to tell the traveler where the slow zone stops. Small town speed signs are generally better obeyed than here. Why? The natives obey them themselves, and the traveler catches on within a block.

The main impression is that the people are much alike. Fifty miles travel in Europe would find more divergence. Maybe that is why they are fighting and we are holding conventions.
