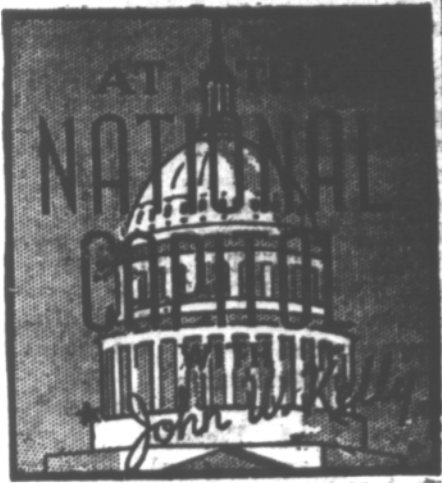

Farm Bureau To Hold Convention

The sixth Annual Convention of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation will be held in the Columbia Gorge Hotel near Hood River on November 14 and 15, according to Mac Hoke, president of the Federation.

Mr. Hoke states that the first day will be devoted to committee meetings, and committees representing the principal commodities of Oregon have been appointed and are expected to bring in constructive suggestions for the forthcoming year's program of the Bureau.

The Annual Banquet of the organization is to be held in the evening of the 14th, with Chas. W. Smith, State Leader of County Agents as toast master.

Among other numbers will be an address by W. R. Ogg, Legislative Representative of the American Farm Bureau Federation, of Washington, D. C.

Mrs. Chas. W. Sewell, Administrative Director of the Associated Women of the American Farm Bureau Federation, will also be in attendance at the convention, and will address the same.

Other speakers listed to address the convention are Dean W. A. Schoenfeld, Dr. E. L. Potter, J. D. Mielke, Director of Agriculture, Paul W. Knapp, State Director of the State Farm Mutual Automobile Insurance Company, and Dr. R. O. H. Maughan, Economist of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Spokane, Washington.

Governor Sprague Senses Swell For Willkie

Return From Midwest Finds Governor Certain of Victory in Central States

Governor Charles A. Sprague, who recently completed a two week stump tour through the midwest in behalf of Wendell Willkie and Charles L. McNary, believes the republican ticket has that area "in the bag."

He made the trip with his son Wallace, visiting 14 states traveling by train, auto, bus, and airplane. In eight of the states he made speeches before clubs, political groups and at impromptu gatherings, and over the radio, once on a state-wide hookup in Oklahoma.

"In the midwest Willkie prospects are certainly excellent. In the north central mid-west it is almost a certainty that the republicans will prevail, with good prospects of carrying Missouri and Oklahoma as well," Sprague said.

"In all those states," he continued, "there is a marked defection among the democrats swing away from Mr. Roosevelt on the third term issue."

"I found Charley Mac (Oregon's Sen. Charles L. McNary) in high favor all through the agricultural area. The farmers have watched his career and his politics for a good many years and they like the way he does things."

"Political leaders in most of the states I visited believe the republican campaign they have been conducting will bear fruit. They have been in politics a long time, and they certainly wouldn't be fooling themselves."

It was the first stump tour of its kind the governor had ever taken, he having been a political amateur until he was rocketed into the governor's chair in 1938 on an immense boom. The frequent talking he did on the trip left his voice obviously tired but he said "It was a strenuous campaign but I enjoyed it."

The importance of the national election November 5 has so far overshadowed state issues that many persons have nearly forgotten that Oregon has several interesting state races upcoming.

Most important state races will be between Leslie M. Scott of Portland and Al Brown, also of Portland, for state treasurer, and between incumbent I. H. Van Winkle, rep., and Bruce Spaulding, Dallas, for attorney general.

Scott, the republican candidate to succeed Walter Pearson as state treasurer, is given the edge over Brown, the democratic choice, because of his state wide acquaintance. Van Winkle has been staying off threats to his position for years but is making an active campaign in an effort to turn back Spaulding, the Polk county district attorney who gained prominence in his prosecution of "goon" cases last year.

Of national importance will be the races for congress. Two of the incumbents, James Mott of Salem and Homer Angell of Portland, are republicans and anti-new deal. Mott is opposed by Charles Robertson, retired army man that lives at West Salem, across the river from Mott's home. Angell, it is believed will have a real contest against Nan Wood Honeyman, New Dealer, personal friend of the Roosevelts, and an old campaigner. Mrs. Honeyman represented the third district before Angell defeated her in 1938.

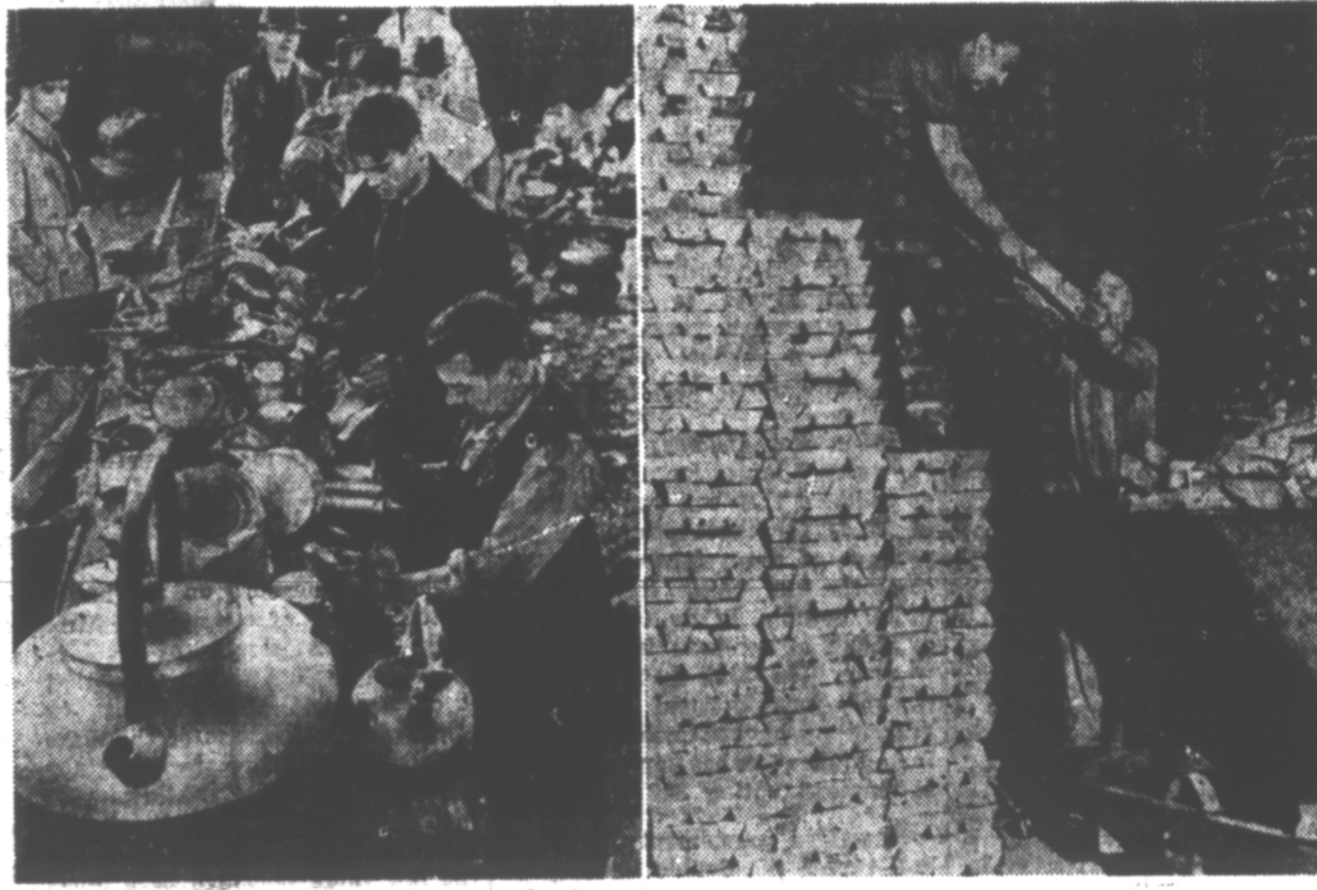
In the third district Walter M. Pierce, the old democratic war horse, is defending his fortress against Rex Ellis, former state senator now hoping to branch out into wider fields.

Remainder of the local interest in the campaign seems centered on local issues and measures put on to the ballot by initiative or referendum. Among these are measures designed to give control of liquor sales to private individuals (and the doing away of the present Knox liquor control law), a plan to legalize gambling in the state, and a measure which would abolish the milk control law.

There will be 11 districts voting on whether or not to form Peoples' Utility Districts, and the election of local officials, county

More Voters Registered In Sherman County

Reasonably Large Vote Expected Next Tuesday Despite Rainy Weather

Next Tuesday the largest number of people may go to the polls in Sherman county for several years. Despite the drop in population more voters are registered than for a long time. The number able to vote here is 1456 of which 858 are listed as Republicans and 587 as Democrats although these proportions have little to do with the probable vote this year when the candidates are not typical of their parties.

Only contest that has attracted any attention is the race for president and the war and the fine fall rains have overshadowed that race as a subject for conversation. Buttons, window cards and a few guarded conversations have made up the campaign here.

Congress Race Hot

Following the presidential nominees on the ballot is the next most important group of office seekers, those running for congressman from the second district of Oregon. Walter M. Pierce, 79, is running for re-election and is opposed by Rex Ellis, state senator from Umatilla county who is making his campaign largely on Pierce's vote on certain labor matters.

State officers to be filled are treasurer and attorney general. Leslie Scott is the republican nominee and Al Brown is the Democratic for state treasurer. Scott has campaigned in this county and it is expected that his qualifications will have a greater appeal to voters here.

Spaulding Former Resident

I. H. Van Winkle, attorney general, is opposed by Bruce Spaulding young Democratic candidate who comes from Polk county. Spaulding is a son of Frank Spaulding, who was an early day minister here. He has the backing of some Republicans who approve of his record as district attorney of Polk county.

District 18, comprising Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler counties is to elect a senator. W. H. Sefwer of Wheeler county is the only nominee and has the name of both parties after his on the ballot.

Two men are to be elected as representatives from the 22nd legislative district which comprises Gilliam, Morrow, Sherman and Wheeler counties. Incumbent is Giles French, of Sherman county, who has served since the 1935 special session. F. Harvey Miller, Republican, and Chas. T. McElligott, Democrat, both of Morrow county are new candidates for office.

D. A. Unopposed

T. Lester Johnson is unopposed for district attorney for Sherman county. He is now serving his first term.

Only two contests are on the ballot for county offices. Margaret Peetz, assessor, E. M. Alley, corner, and David Reid, commissioner, having no competition.

Offices for which there is competition are clerk, for which Joe Truitt, Republican incumbent, and Ross Ornduff, Democrat and present deputy sheriff, are vying, and for sheriff which is wanted by both Harry Kanesman, Republican, and C. C. Wilson, Democratic incumbent. There has been little interest displayed in these offices despite much hard work done by some of the candidates.

Cities Also Electing

Nine measures are on the ballot and these have all been explained before. The recommendations of this paper on them are made in another column.

Two supreme court judges, John Rand and George Rossmann, are running unopposed on the non-partisan ballot and county school superintendent Wily W. Knighten is also running for re-election as a non-partisan.

Each of the three towns will hold a city election but so far as has been noted there is but one race on any of the ballots, that for treasurer of Grass Valley which is wanted by Mrs. I. D. Pike and Mrs. A. W. Cantrell.
