## Drop In Oil Rate Upheld By Farmers

Interest in the price of diesel fuel was marked this week as petitions were circulated asking the public utilities commissioner to prevent the changing of new rates that made a reduction possible. In this county diesel fuel was cut a half cent in Moro and Grass Valley and three quarters of a cent in Wasco because of reductions made by the Union Pacific which went into effect September 18.

This reduction has been protested by truckers and others and a public hearing is being held today before the commissioner. J. B. Adams is representing the farmers of the district affected and the petitions have been circulated to strengthen his hand.

The new rates for grain in Gilliam and Morrow counties will go into effect December first according to word from T. W. Swobe of The Dalles. This means a cent lower freight rates for shippers in those counties.

## Elk Season Opens November First

The last of the 1940 big game seasons opens on November 1 with the bull and cow elk season in northeastern Oregon and continues through November 16. Cow elk may be shot only if the hunter possesses one of the special cow elk tags, 2,000 of which were sold by the Oregon State Game commission.

Elk territory embraces all of Union, Umatilla, Grant, Morrow, and Baker counties and a portion of Wallawa county. The cow elk territory does not embrace the entire bull elk area.

All hunters planning to indulge in elk hunting are warned that tags are necessary for both cow and bull elk. All hunters are required to check in and also out of the elk territory. Checking out is a requisite even though the hunter has not bagged an elk.

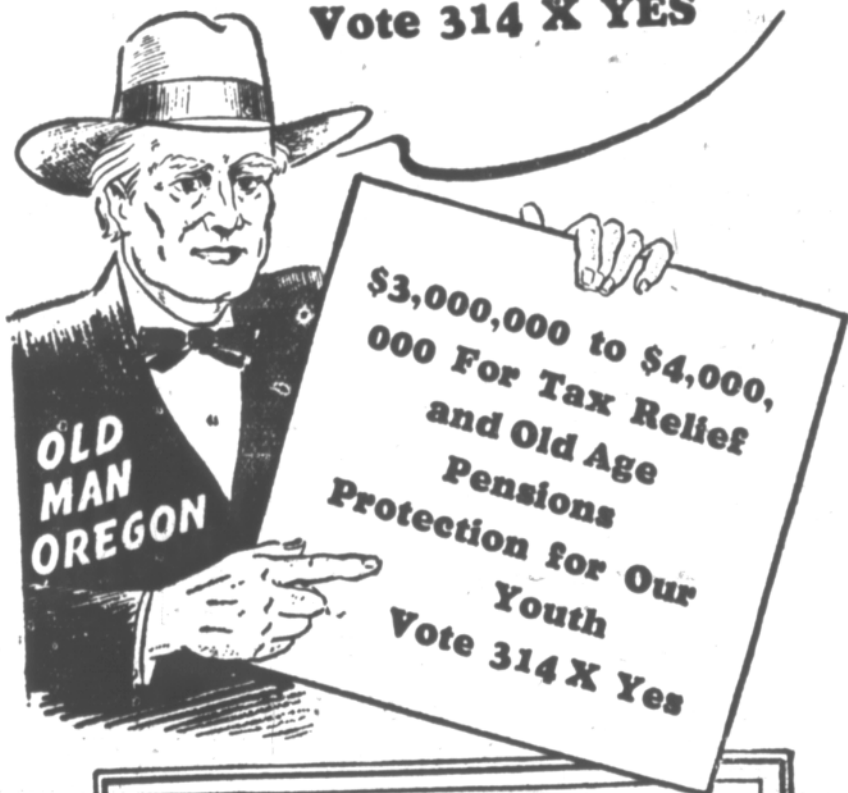
