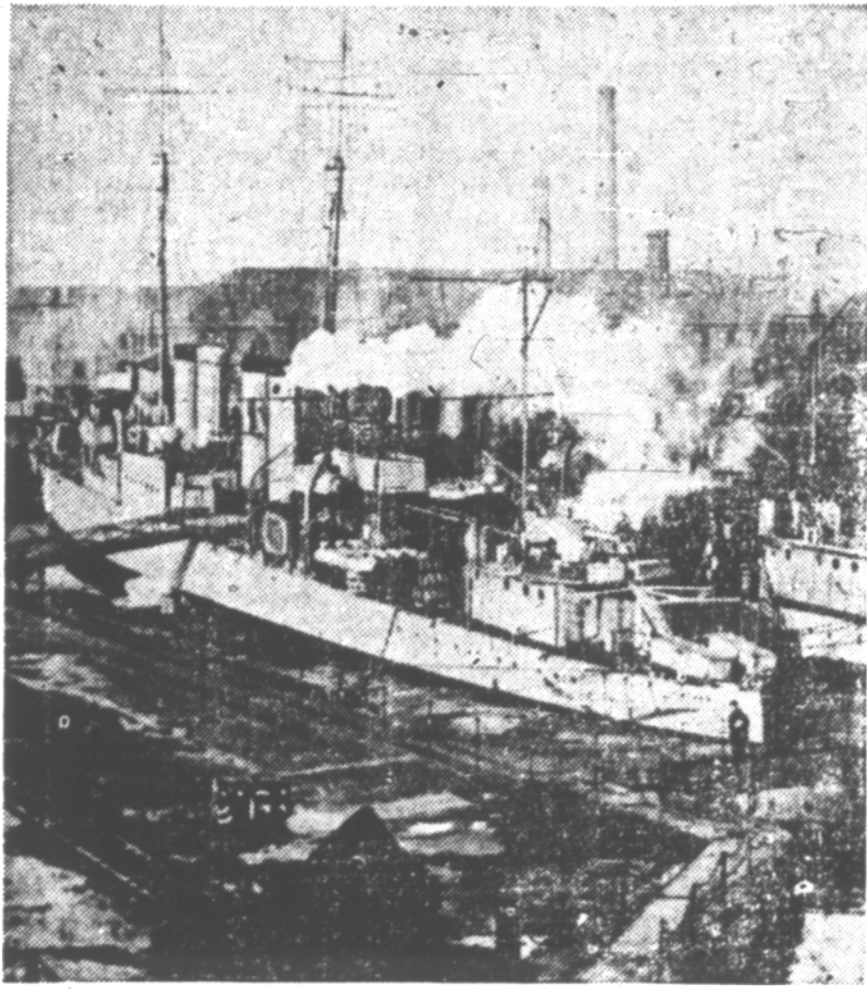

Newspaper To Hold Meeting

University of Oregon, Jan. 2.—(Special)—With a guest speaker but that includes the president of the National Editorial Association, Roy Brown, publisher of the San Rafael, California, Independent, and Chester Rowell, editor of the San Francisco Chronicle, newspapermen from all parts of Oregon will gather at the University of Oregon school of journalism January 10 and 11 for the 23 annual press conference, it was announced here by George Turnbull, professor of journalism in charge of the program.

The conference will spend much of its time on two important topics selective service and labor standards, Professor Turnbull states. Here to speak at the luncheon Friday and available for conferences will be Col. Elmer V. Wooten, head of selective service of Oregon. A headline speaker on labor relations and wages will be Wayne L. Morse, dean of the school of law at the university and recently re-appointed coast arbitrator for maritime labor relations.

Mr. Rowell will be main speaker at the annual banquet Friday evening, and Mr. Brown will take part in panel discussions during the two day session. Regular journalism topics such as advertising, circulation, make-up, editorial policies and sampling of public opinion will be taken up, with a number of prominent Oregon newspapermen on panels.

Among them will be Giles L. French, Sherman County Journal; Sheldon Sackett, Coos Bay Times; Donald J. Sterling, Oregon Journal; Palmer Hoyt, The Oregonian; Frank Jenkins, Klamath Falls Herald; Hugh G. Ball, Hood River News; John Vorseueron, Astorian Budget; Eric W. Allen, dean of the school of journalism, and Charles M. Hulton, professor of journalism.

With Mr. French, president, presiding, the Oregon Newspaper Publishers' Association will hold its semi-annual meeting Saturday morning. W. Verne McKinney, Hillsboro Argus, is press conference president, and Mr. Turnbull is secretary.

Features for the conference include songs by the Eugene Gleemen at the annual banquet, and Oregon-Washington State basketball games, at which editors will be guests both nights.

AAA COMMITTEEMEN TO CONFER THIS MONTH

The first state conference of AAA county committeemen to be held in Oregon has been called to meet at Oregon State college January 15 to 17, inclusive, announces Will Steen, chairman of the state committee.

The session will bring together some 180 officers of the 36 county Agricultural Conservation associations including the three county committeemen, the county secretary, and in some instances the assistant secretary.

Several national AAA officials from Washington D. C., will attend the conference to join in the discussions of the 1941 program, proposals for 1942, and general administrative matters.

Delegates to the conference will be divided into seven general committees to give separate consideration to certain phases up for discussion. Local arrangements are in charge of N. C. Donaldson, state executive assistant.
