

Moro High School Students May Write Essays

The local Chris Schultz Unit under the direction of Mrs. Seral Searcy, Americanism chairman, is offering the junior and senior high school students an opportunity to take part in a national essay contest.

Mr. R. G. Cunliff, principal of Moro schools, has been approached and feels the plan will be of interest to the students as prizes are being offered for the first and second best local essays. The winners to be sent to compete in the state contest and if successful, will compete in the national contest, both offering prizes.

Junior and Senior high school pupils are eligible in the Americanism contest choosing one of the three subjects given for a 500 word essay.

For the National Defense essay the senior high students are to write an essay of 800 to 1000 words on "Selective Service—Its effects on Youth." Junior high students are to write an essay of 800 to 1000 words on "How Can I Protect America?"

The essays are to be judged by a local committee as follows: 75% on subject matter, 15% on composition and 10% on general appearance (neatness, spelling, writing, etc.)
