Harry McDonald joined the navy and is stationed at San Diego, California.

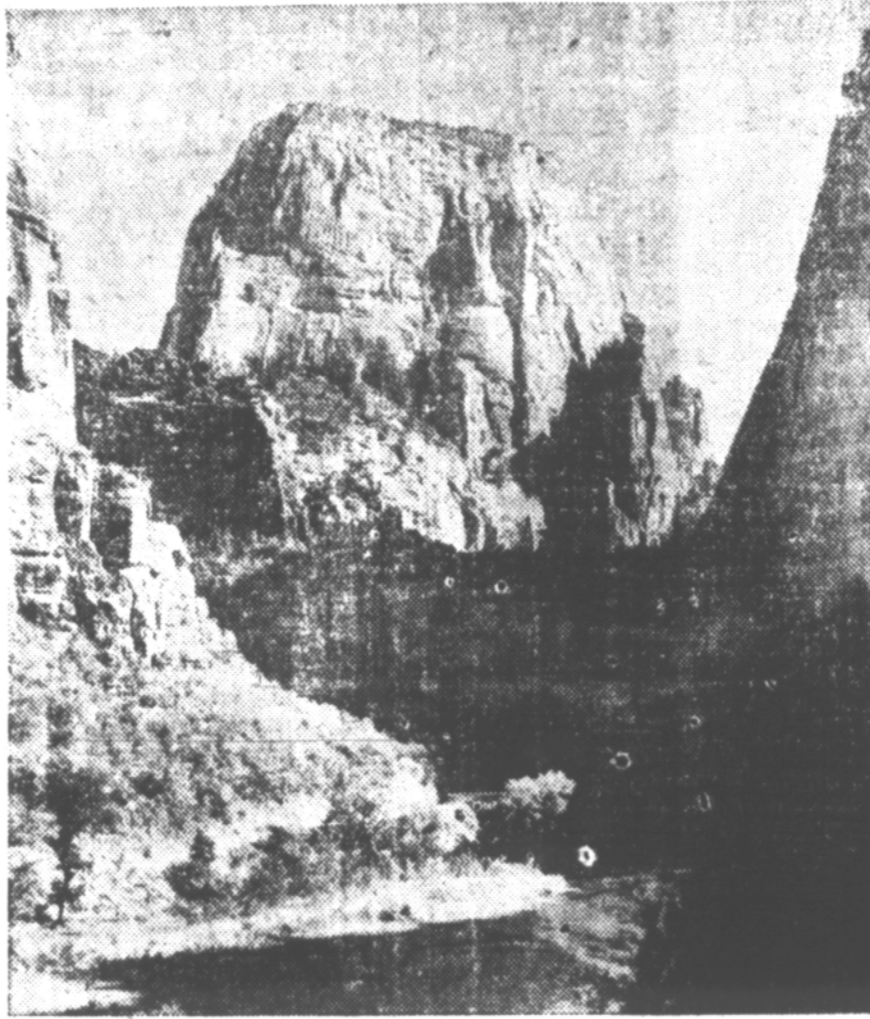
