Traffic Accidents Must be Reported

All traffic accidents in Oregon must be reported, regardless of the amount of property damage or whether any one was killed or injured, Earl Snell, secretary of state, replied today in answer to several inquiries on this matter received from Oregon citizens.

Confusion exists in the minds of many on this matter, these queries indicated. Many persons believe there is a minimum property damage limit under which accident need not be reported. Some states, for example, do not require reporting of accidents in which no one is killed or injured and property damage amounts to less than \$50.00. However, in Oregon, there is no such legal minimum and all accidents must be reported.

(Accidents in rural areas should be reported to the sheriff of the county in which the accident occurred while accidents in urban areas should be reported to the chief of police. These reports are required to be made within 24 hours of the time the accident occurred.

Accident reports in Oregon are not open to public inspection and may not be admitted as evidence in any court action arising from any accident, it was emphasized.

The reports are used in assembling facts on accidents with the view of improving conditions and preventing their recurrence.
