Newport Invites State To Eat Crabs

Newport, Ore., (Special)—Newport will inaugurate the 1941 summer season for the Oregon coast this year by staging the town's fourth annual Crab Festival from May 2 to 4 with a greatly enlarged new program, and the old slogan of "Free Crab for Everybody."

Launched three years ago simply as "Crab Day" to assist fishermen to dispose of an excess catch of crab, the idea was so well received by the general public that the Crab Festival grew into an annual event.

Committees headed by Newport's leading business men are working out the varied details of a three-day program including selection and crowing of the Crab Festival Queen, water sports on Yaquina Bay, Coast Guard drill in the surf at Nye Beach, an agate exhibit, day and night carnival, numerous dances and private social affairs.

Highlight of the occasion is of course the free distribution of ocean caught crabs. Cooked and halved, these tasty crustaceans are passed out freely to all comers. Last year twelve hundred dozen crabs were served to around 20,000 people. How many hundred dozen of crabs will be required this year is anybody's guess but Newport anticipates twice as many visitors as last year.
