REGISTRANTS MUST CARRY CARDS

Amendment of Selective Service Regulations to make it mandatory for every registrant to have his registration certificate in his personal possession at all times and to

sent it upon request of proper authorities was announced today by Lt. Colonel Elmer V. Wooten, State Director of Selective Service for Oregon.

Colonel Wooten made his announcement upon receipt of advice from National Headquarters that

the registrant "should carry his registration certificate with him at all times as he may be required to show it from time to time," the revised Regulations provide:

"The registrant must have his registration certificate in his personal possession at all times, and

upon request, must exhibit it to any law enforcement officer, any Selective Service official of National Headquarters or of a State Headquarters, or any member of the local board or board of appeal."

Failure of a registrant to have

his registration certificate in his personal possession, or to exhibit it upon request of authorized officials, will constitute a violation of the Regulations, and in addition, shall be construed as prima facie evidence of his failure to register, Colonel Wooten said.
