State Jobs Open For Accountants

Applications to take tests for five classes of jobs soon to be open with the State Unemployment Compensation Commission must be made to the Board of Examiners in Portland before Saturday, June 7. Professor William Griffith, supervisor, announced today.

With many being called to active service and defense work, several of the merit registers are near exhaustion. The work for which tests will be held include employment officers at \$1500 to \$2100 a year and statisticians from \$1440 to \$2640.

Information may be obtained at any of the 26 state employment offices. The examination will be held June 21 at Salem, Portland, LaGrande, Roseburg and Klamath Falls.

Geraldine Norton was a dinner guest of Mr. and Mrs. James Robertson in Shaniko Sunday.

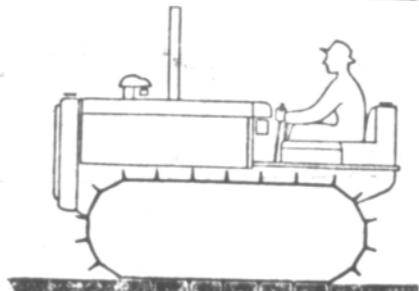

STRAWBERRY TIME

With the markets full of strawberries and the world full of strawberry hungry people, there could not be such a thing as too many good strawberry dishes. Strawberries should be served often—every day in fact—for the season is never long enough.

If you must have reasons for eating strawberries, they are, like berries in general, excellent sources of vitamin C. To make the most of this vitamin C in strawberries it is best to eat them uncooked. This is good news, too, for the simplest dishes are the real favorites with most everyone. Strawberries and plenty of good thick cream, strawberry shortcake piled high with whipped cream, or strawberries served over ice cream are enough to make any mouth water even with the thought of them.

Colorful and refreshing - strawberries have a place in many spring time dishes. Appetizing, refreshing frozen desserts to popular at this time of year, salads, and milk drinks - all seem to have more appeal with fresh strawberries used in them.

Here are some recipes - not to supplant the old favorites - but so that you can take advantage every day of the short season and serve strawberries often and in different ways.

Strawberry Sherbet
One cup crushed strawberries
Six tablespoons sugar
One tablespoon orange juice

One tablespoon lemon juice
One teaspoon unflavored gelatin
Two cups milk
Few grains salt
One egg white

Combine crushed strawberries with sugar, orange juice and lemon juice; let stand 30 minutes. Press through sieve. Sprinkle gelatin over 1 cup of milk; heat until gelatin is dissolved; combine with remaining milk and salt. Pour into freezing tray; chill. Beat egg white stiff; fold into strawberry mixture. Combine chilled milk mixture with strawberry mixture. Pour into freezing tray; freeze, stirring several times during freezing. Serves 4.

Strawberry Chiffon Pie
One recipe Corn Flake crust
Two cups crushed strawberries
One half cup sugar
Few grains salt
One and a half envelopes unflavored gelatin
One fourth cup cold water
Two egg whites
One cup heavy cream
Line 10 in. pie pan with Corn Flake crust, pressing against bottom and sides of pan; chill. Add sugar and salt to berries. Beat egg whites stiff. Whip cream; fold into egg whites. Fold cream mixture into berry mixture. Pile in pie pan. Chill.
Corn Flake Crust: One third cup butter

One fourth cup sugar
One cup finely crushed corn flakes
Melt butter. Add sugar and crushed corn flakes. Mix thoroughly
