Mrs. H. P. Discher returned to her home in Portland Monday after a stay of five weeks at the home of her sister, Mrs. Ethel May.

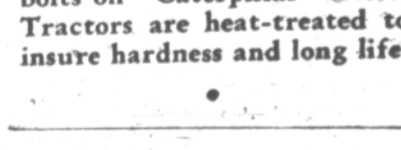

Seventeen Rural Lines Tax Exempt

Seventeen rural telephone lines in Sherman county have taken advantage of the law passed in 1941 giving tax exemption to such lines. In 1940 there were 36 rural lines in the county and this means that approximately half of them have qualified for the exemption. Rulings of the tax commission make it necessary for the lines to pay delinquencies before becoming exempt.

PCAs LOAN: \$2,000,000,000

Bacon for Britain is going to be produced with the help of the two billionth dollar loaned by the Production Credit system according to J. W. Hoech, The Dalles, secretary treasurer of the Mid-Columbia Production Credit association.

The two millionth dollar was loaned this month to Martin Paulson, corn-hog farmer of Grinnel, Iowa.

"Here in the mid-Columbia district", Hoech pointed out, "we have used more than ten million dollars of Production Credit in our own association. We have used it to grow wheat and fruit, raise steers, lambs and wool; to buy farm machinery and to meet all the other credit needs of the farmer."

"While we are doing this, however, we are not losing sight of the fact that this is a dangerous time for our members to expand beyond the reasonable capacity of their plants and equipment, and we are emphasizing that this is a time to get out of debt, rather than to create new debts."
