FLORIDA LAWS PROTECT COW, NOT MOTORIST

If you drive down the highway in Florida and hit a cow causing an accident resulting in your death—you needn't worry about your estate having to pay for the cow. The Florida legislature has just enacted a statute that makes this generous provision, according to the Oregon State Motor association. However, should the accident not result in your death but merely personal injury, then the owner of a cow can collect from you.

In a bulletin issued last week regarding range laws controlling livestock on the highway, the Oregon State Motor association said that Florida is one of the few states allowing livestock to roam at will on public highways. The bulletin summarized Oregon range laws as follows:

"The range laws governing livestock on Oregon highways are promulgated by the individual counties so that there will be certain differences in all portions of the state. In general, Oregon counties hold the farmer responsible for his livestock when it roams on the highway. However, if the motorist injures or kills livestock on a private roadway he will probably be held responsible to the owner of the livestock."
